Prof. Zavitz, J. Lockie Wilson and & A. Putman Were the Orators

At the meeting held on Thursday connection with the short courses, three very able and instructive ad-

dresses were given. chair was occupied by Mr. Johnson Ellis, president of the West Victoria Agricultural Society, who lost no time in introducing the speakers of the evening.

Prof. Zavitz was the first speaker. who discussed the subject of experimental work on the farm and pointed out a variety of methods which the department had introduced in this connection.

Mr. Lewis, of Verulam, one of the most successful of the competitors in the competition, said if he had sowed the grain earlier by four days in one case he would probably have secured another prize. In parts on Ontario the land is not cultivated sufficiently. It should be plowed in the fall and carefully gone over in the spring again. The output of Ontario farms has doubled in 15 years, and there is plenty of room for development yet. We do not realize the extent or resources of our province. The blending of the races gives us a splendid people too.

Mr. J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of fairs, was the next speaker. He alluded to the prizes won by Victoria County at the Chicago World's Fair, and said the agricultural classes, six of which had been established in the province, had been marvelously successful. He delivered a strong panegyric on Canada, and

elicited much applause. Supt. Putman, in the course of an address, said that the young men were the class who had to be impressed with the desirability of improved farming. The farmers do not believe all they are told about scientific farming. They want demonstrations to prove the usefulness of newer methods. The speaker dwelt on farmer's institute clubs for some time. He spoke on the large membershipand the vast work being done by the woman's institutes and the information on cooking and housework disseminated by these meetings was a splendid feature of these women's institutes. The homes are made more comfortable and homelike through the influence of these institutes, and the children are induced to stay at

Farmers Get Some Valuable Information at Wednesday's Session

Wednesday afternoon, at 1.30 the score card was used on an aged bull belonging to the Ops Agricultural Society and three bull calves, one a seven months old calf belonging to Jas-Casey, of Valentia, a six months old one of Isaac Moynes, Cambray and an eleven months old calf of Jas-Cayley's of Ops.

After all had formed their opinions of the animals Prof. Day pointed out and discussed the points of the big bull first. He summed up by saying that it was a good strong all round bull which, although not as good as it might be, would look immensely better when fattened and fitted up for show purposes. He said he had not spared his criticism as he knew. it was in a sense a public property. and he would be hurting no person's business in particular if he discussed it freely without prejudice.

In dealing with the calves next he compared the three, remarking particularly on the good all round quali-

ties of that owned by Mr. Casey.
