Port Hope Scared Smallpox Epidemic

Physicians are Charged with Spreading to spread." the Disease--- Medical Men Indignant

Port Hope, Feb. 3rd. - That the stories which are current as to prevalence and danger of smallpox are exaggerated seems certain, but while there is no one willing to come out and back the insinuations which have been made to the effect that certain local physicians are not taking sufficient precautions to check the spread of the disease, there seems to be unrest among the townspeople because more care is not being paid to the epidemic, and matters are not being dealt with more strictly. At present, and these are located in different parts of the town. The houses where the patients are have been placed under quarantine, but this only applies

ONE GUARD FOR ALL,

For the entire town there is but one guard, and he makes his round twice a day, leaving the inmates of the homes which have been placarded to shift for themselves while he is gone, and if they see fit there is no reason why they may not enjoy all the privileges of the other citizens of the town. There has been no attempt to isolate in a building or tent those who have developed the disease, and move the Board of Health consider unnecessary as the smallpox is of a very mild character, and some cases is scarcely discernible. Although the Board of Health have in their possession a suitable tent they do not expect to have to bring it into use unless the epidemic becomes much more serious.

NOT SPREADING DISEASE.

F. "It is unthinkable," said Dr. Dickinson, "that an attending physician should be responsible for the spread of an infectious disease through his own criminal negligence. We are complying with every clause of the law governing the situation, and that is

"Every day or two someone tells of a case which he thinks resembles smallpox. But when we find the man where those quarantined see fit to or woman out the trouble which they have had has disappeared and we can do nothing in the matter.

> "There can be only one method lor the stamping out of the present epidemic, and that is to have everyone vaccinated. With this in view, the Council have prepared a by-law to compel all to be vaccinated, but, as this only received its first reading on Monday night it cannot be put through until the next regular meeting, which will not take place for another two weeks," said Dr. Dick-

In addition to the above by-law the Council carried the following resolution at its last session: "That the Board of Health request the Provincial Board to send an expert on small pox to Port Hope to give instructions in the supposed smallpox cas-

NO BUILDINGS CLOSED

No effort is being made to close any of the public places or schools to prevent the spread of the disease as this is thought useless by the local Board of Health, because of the confinement of the epidemic to adults, there having been only one child afflicted up to date. The epidemic has not exceeded \$250 total cost and is not thought that over \$500 will be spent during the entire siege, as most of those who have been quarantined are in a position to pay their way.

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
