### Cutter Load of Young Men Were Pulled up Abruptly

A few evenings ago, around the midnight hour, a local physician was receiving directions from Constable Short at the corner of Kent and Lindsay-sts. regarding the location of a residence in the east ward where he had been summoned to attend a patient. Suddenly vociferous shouting broke the stillness of the night followed by the appearance of a white horse attached to a cutter coming across the bridge at break-neck speed. The occupants of the cutter, fully a dozen young men, were returning from a dance in the country, and were, it is said, primed to the neck with corn juice.

Up the hill they came, shouting like blood-thirsty Apaches, when Constable Short stepped out on the road with the intention of stopping the mad rush.

Fortunately an overcheck was hanging and the officer by a quick move grabbed it and brought the horse to a standstill, so suddenly that a number of the young men took a header out on the road, while one of them was nearly thrown on the horse's back. One or two of them evidently thought that discretion was the better part of valor, for they quickly decamped. The others were given a pretty severe lecture by the constable and allowed to go with a warning.

## To Keep Alive Citizen's League

### Enthusiastic Meeting of General Committee of this Organization

The general committee of the Citizens' League met on Tuesday night. Matters relating to the recent campaign were discussed and many irregularities in connection with the polling on 3rd inst. were brought to the notice of the committee. A small committee was appointed to investigate and report, and the results will be made public later. A strong desire was expressed that the league should be kept alive and the general committee reorganized and strengthened for the purpose of exerting all the influence possible in favor of a vigorous enforcement of the license laws and to make the league a strong factor in the elections for the town council next year.

It was also decided that agitation should be kept up for the abolition of the 3-5th clause and that another vote be taken at the earliest date provided by law for the doing away with the barroom and the treating system in Lindsay.

His father and mother are both dead, also an elder brother, who met death by drowning ten years ago. Robert was the only remaining one of the family. A widow and four children are left practically unprovided for.

### What has been Done for Farmers and Advancement of Agriculture

The great interest being taken in the four days' short course being held here under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture was abundantly indicated by the large and thoroughly appreciative audience at the Academy of Music last night to listen to the splendid addresses given there. The addresses were supplemented by several interesting moving pictures.

Mr. Thos. Stewart made an excellent chairman, and in a brief but pointed address introduced the first speakers.

MR. MACRAE.

representing the dairy department at Ottawa dealt particularly with the dairy interests. In opening he remarked that in all the five years that he had been travelling the Dominion and attending meetings, he never had the pleasure of attending one that created so much interest as the four days' judging classes here had. As to dairy cattle he said that the first and all important feature was the feed. If cows are not fed enough and the proper food they were a losing proposition, and the farmer might as well get out of business at once. Get the feed right, then start raising the standard of the herd and at the same time start culling out the unprofitable animals. Whether a cow is profitable or not is very easily and cheaply ascertained by the cow testing system which is now being so profitably and generally adopted. He remarked on the progress the Eastern Ontario farmers had been making the past year or two and he looked for great results in the near future.

PRES. CREELMAN

Prof. Creelman was next introduced by the chairman. He prefaced his address by some eloquent general remarks, and then dealt with the rapid advancement being made by the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph. The student body had grown till now there were representatives of a great many nations there, and the new year term showed a membership of over 1,000 pupils.

It was not alone due to the advantages of the course of study at Guelph that such satisfactory progress was being made, but also on account of the example given the superior work in agriculture done by the good English, Irish and Scotch stock, who were farming in Canada. Mr. Creelman bespoke the respect internationally shared for Canadians in different lines of endeavor.

At Guelph there were two institutions the college and the experimental farm. There were between thirty and forty thousand visitors to these each June, and it was the actual results on the experimental farm that appealed to the farmer, rather than the college. On the farm at Guelph it was the business to grow the superior and inferior grade of grains, and discard the inferior kinds for the best. The speaker gave some most interesting technical information on crop production. He showed the great results in the increase of yields of various crops, as the result of careful and persistent experiment on the experimental farm.

The much praised west was referred to as a great country, undoubtedly, but it should be borne in mind, in spite of bank statements, that Ontario, as shown by the last official statistics compiled, those for 1908, has produced sixty per cent. more for the year than the entire west.

"Ontario," said the speaker amid great enthusiasm, "is the best province in the Dominion."

Prof. Creelman next touched on live stock, the study of which was an important branch in the college curriculum and spoke of the practical results which demonstrated the success that attended the instruction in this department.

Other branches of the college work and their educational value with the highest practical end in view were dealt with and shown by the speaker to be of vital importance of every-day, money-making farming.

### Stock and Seed Judging Course

### Much Good Will Result from the Third Annual Short Course

That a world of good should result from the short course now being held in this town, is the unanimous opinion of all those who have attended the various sessions of the course.

It was surprising to note the great interest taken by the crowd that attended. At least 700 or 800 attended the session yesterday afternoon. When such interest is being taken in this particular event, it would be idle to predict just where the movement will end. Many of those in attendance are from a distance, several having come over 25 miles and they are staying for two or three days to take advantage of the instruction offered.

Mr. MacRae of the Live Stock Commissioners' staff, Ottawa, amply demonstrated himself to be a master of his subject. Comments to the effect that he knew what he was talking about were common, and the fact contributed not a little to the intense interest that was taken in what he had to say. At the outset Mr. MacRae dwelt upon the different breeds of horses. He said that the hackney was the leading sire of carriage horses, the standard bred for road horses and the thoroughbred for saddlers. The different market classes of horses were then described. The different points and the conformation looked for in these various classes were outlined and explained. What types to breed to get these various classes was then taken up. The horses previously mentioned were always placed by those in attendance, after which their reasons were given and a general discussion ensued.
