M'CURDY MAY FLY BACK FROM CUBA

The Canadian Aviator is Anxious to Conquer the Straits—To-day He is the Cubans' Hero

Havana, Cuba, Jan. 31.—J. A. D. McCurdy, the plucky Canadian aviator, who failed yesterday in his attempt to fly here from Key West, after completing 100 miles of the 110 mile trip was the feature of the aviation tour named here to-day.

The interest in the young bird-man was intensified when the report became current that McCurdy might make an attempt to fly back to the United States, starting from Camp Columbia, and landing at Key West.

Negotiations were commenced to-day to try to persuade Mr. McCurdy to consent to the trip, although he did not give a definite answer.

"Flying over a wide expanse of water is much more exhilarating than flying over land. It gives a glorious sensation of mighty distances and the vastness of space. At first I did not like it, but a desire for it has grown. Indeed, I am afraid it may become a habit. I do not know when I shall be able to make another attempt, but I have the fullest confidence in both myself and my Curtiss bi-plane, and I am sure of success."

When McCurdy appeared upon the aviation field to-day he was given a mighty ovation. Smilingly he raised his cap and waved his hand to the enthusiastic Cubans, who cheered him for fully ten minutes.

McCurdy bears his honors well. Although pleased with the interest of the Cubans, he does not seek notoriety. Yesterday McCurdy's machine dropped to the surface of the water when only ten miles of the distance from Key West, Fla., to Havana remained to be completed. His hundred-mile trip broke all records for over-water flights.

LOST ON GOODWIN SANDS

An Unknown Vessel Was Broken to Pieces and Her Crew Drowned

Dover, Eng., Jan. 31.—An unknown sailing vessel ashore on Goodwin Sands to-day and all her crew perished in a terrific gale which swept the English Channel and the Strait of Dover. The vessel crashed ashore in the teeth of the gale, and despite the efforts of life savers to launch their boats, she went to pieces before aid could be sent.

Subsequently three bodies were washed ashore. The vessel went ashore near Walmer. The wind lashed the water to a fury, threatening sea walls and driving all vessels, which could harbor, to safety. A great quantity of wreckage was washed ashore near Folkestone, although no other disasters were reported.

MCSORLEY SENTENCED

The Jarvis Body-Snatcher Gets a Stiff Sentence To-day

Cayuga, Ont., Jan. 31.—John McSorley, of Jarvis, who in November took the body of Matthew Johnston from its grave in the Presbyterian cemetery and shipped it to Montreal in a barrel labelled poultry, was this morning sentenced to five years in the penitentiary by Judge Douglas.
