### CONFESSED MURDER AT PETERBORO

#### Conscience Smitten Gives Himself Up

Peterboro, Feb. 2—This afternoon at 2 o'clock an Englishman giving the name of Alfred Kimberly and his age as twenty-eight years, entered the police station and requested to be placed under arrest for the murder of a woman, which he confessed to have committed in Wiltshire several years ago. He said his conscience bothered him. At first he was regarded by the police as insane, or as shamming for the sake of shelter, but he repeated his story of how he and another man had killed the woman and hidden her behind a hedge so circumstantially that he was held, and will appear in court in the morning. He says he came from Toronto.

### MORTON CONFECTIONERY HAS CHANGED HANDS

Another of Lindsay's oldest businesses has changed hands, Morton's Confectionery having sold out to Mr. Walter McWatters, who will conduct the business in a most up-to-date manner. The new owner takes possession to-morrow (Wednesday) morning.

The late W. J. Morton purchased the business twenty five years ago and conducted it successfully up to the time of his death, after which Mrs. Morton carried it on till the sale took place. Negotiations have been under way for some time, but it was only within the last day or so that the sale was brought to a head.

### Livery Barn Changes Hands

A valuable property which changed hands a couple of days ago is the livery barn and premises on York street, occupied by Mr. Jas. A. Isaacs' city livery service. The property, which was formerly owned by Mr. Dixon Jewett, of Cannington, has been purchased by the present occupant, Mr. Isaacs, who will continue to conduct his progressive livery service in even a better way than in the past.

### Sister Knocked Down by Truck

Peterboro, Feb. 3—While waiting for the C.P.R. train for Peterboro, at 4.45 Friday evening at the Union Station, Toronto a sister of the community of St. Joseph, Peterboro was knocked down and seriously injured by a heavy loaded baggage truck that was being pushed along the platform. Many of the trackmen seem to delight in pushing their loads through a big crowd, careless of whom they injure. The Union Station authorities have started an investigation, and will mete out punishment by dismissal to those guilty of such acts.

The injured sister was able to return to Peterboro, and last reports give her condition as satisfactory.

### Catholic Bishop Flays the Tango

St. John, N. B., Feb. 2—His Lordship Bishop Leblanc, in the Cathedral pulpit yesterday warned Catholics against certain improper and immoral dances of the age. He did not name them, but his inference was plain. He discountenanced Catholic societies permitting them at any of their gatherings, and referred to one society having taken a direct stand against them.

### DUMP GROUND NEEDS ATTENTION

#### Ops Resident Refers to Conditions Existing

The following "strong" communication in reference to the town dump was read at the council meeting last night. If conditions are such as are claimed by the writer, it discloses a serious state of affairs. An investigation will be made:— To the Mayor and Council of Lindsay.

Dear Sirs— I wish to draw your attention to the condition of things at the dump ground. In the spring time it is very offensive to the public travelling along the highway to and from town, especially when the wind is from the east. The neighboring people around the vicinity of said dump consider it a very rank nuisance, at any season of the year, but more especially disagreeable, and a menace to health in spring and summer seasons.

Now to give you an outline of what it is like from personal observations, carcasses of dead horses lying on the top of the ground, till too rank to be borne any longer; with hundreds of crows feasting on them for weeks before being buried. Down in the pit where the town took out gravel, and where the garbage has been thrown in, there are thousands of rats playing hide and seek, with no one to molest their frolicsome sports.

### CEMENT WHARF FOR LINDSAY

#### Will Town Send Delegation to Ottawa?

Ald. Nicholls is hot foot after a cement wharf for Lindsay, and will not be satisfied until he gets it. He will not be satisfied with sending a memorial to Ottawa, as he has realized that they are usually pigeon-holed. He wants a delegation to get right out after things, the same as in Peterboro. Last night he submitted a resolution, seconded by Ald. Irvine, that the Mayor be instructed to call a public meeting to consider the question of further pavement construction and also to appoint a delegation to visit Ottawa and urge upon the government to construct a cement wharf at Lindsay.

Dep.-Reeve Smale said it would be unwise to take up the question of constructing permanent roads this year, because the town could not undertake the heavy expenditure. It had reached its limit, and if any excessive expenditure was undertaken, the council would be held responsible.

Mayor Beal said the citizens had a right to express their opinions.

Ald. Baker agreed with Ald. Smale and said he would support a motion dealing with the wharf question.

Dep.-Reeve Warren said that he would support the resolution, not because he wanted to see more paved roads, but because he was anxious to see a cement wharf. The reason Peterboro and other centres were successful in getting things from the government, was because they got out after them and Lindsay got nothing. We blamed our member, said Mr. Warren, but we have ourselves to blame.

Town Clerk Ray—We got an armory.

Dep.-Reeve Warren—Yes, but Peterboro got one costing \$200,000, and are getting other things.

It looked as if Ald. Nicholls' motion would be defeated if the reference to paving was included, but Dep.-Reeve Warren suggested that the resolution read "That the Mayor be requested to call a public meeting to discuss questions of import to the municipality and also appoint a committee to petition the government re the cement wharf at Lindsay-st."

This was adopted unanimously.

### FAIRVIEW SHEEP AT WINTER FAIRS

Starting in at Toronto in November, of the 15 first prizes in competition they were awarded 13. There they won all of the 4 pen premiums, all four championships offered for single sheep; the only championship offered for flocks of the medium-wooled breeds, and the grand championship for the best wether on exhibition. Going on to Chicago's International they won many first premiums in sections, four championships of the eight offered, and the \$50 grand championship for the best wether at the show, with a second grand championship and the \$50 duplicated by the American Shropshire Association.

Last year a similar winning of both grand championships was made at Chicago, to which were added two championships for Shearling ewe as well as a full share of the other best premiums.

Coming back to Guelph in early December where the classification is limited, a large majority of the offered first prizes were won with two of the three for flocks and the two championships offered in classes.

Summing up the plums of the three shows of the 15 championships in reach, 11 have come to the Fairview flock, and of the season's 3 grand championships all have been awarded to the well known breeders J. & D. J. Campbell, of Woodville, Ont., whose efforts have been highly appreciated by many kind friends all over Canada and the States.—Canadian Farm.

### PARCEL POST STARTS TUESDAY

#### Official Notice Received by Postmaster Palen

Postmaster Palen has received official notice from the Post Office Department, Ottawa that the parcel post system will be inaugurated on Tuesday next, February 10th. Articles of mail matter acceptable at parcel post rates include warm and dairy products, merchandise of all descriptions, such as dry goods, groceries, hardware, confectionery, stationery, (including bank checks, etc.), seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts, and other matter not included in the first class, and not excluded from the mails by the general prohibitory regulations with respect to objectionable matter.

Parcels consisting of third class matter may be mailed at parcel post rates, or third class matter rate at the option of the sender.

Parcels containing intoxicating liquors or explosives are expressly prohibited.

### Local Business Properties Sold

An important deal took place Monday in Lindsay real estate whereby a number of Kent-st stores changed hands. The executors of the late Michael Guiry sold the stores occupied by Jas. Dwyer, grocer, T. Bakogeorge, confectioner, and G. A. Little, stationer, to the respective tenants.

Messrs Dwyer, Little and Bakogeorge made their purchase through Mr. L. R. Knight. The properties have a combined frontage of sixty or seventy five feet on Kent-st and extend some distance in the rear.

#### Leased McGaffey Store

Mrs. Weir, proprietor of the 5, 10 and 15 cent store, has leased the E. W. McGaffey store, and will occupy it the first of May.

### Important Real Estate Deal

On Monday the stores occupied by S. Fusco and Yeates' shoe shining parlor, on Kent-st. were purchased by Mr. V. Delisi, brother-in-law, of Mr. Fusco. The property, which has 23 feet frontage, sold at a good figure.

### Orillia Firm Gets Contract
