### Fight on Train Proved Expensive

Belleville Ontario: The Grand Trunk depot was the scene at midnight of a wild conflict between Campbellford men and officers of the Grand Trunk. Some men had come down with the hockeyists and curlers, and instead of going to the games, spent their time otherwise. The special had reached the depot about midnight, and was stopped at the platform. The travelling peace officer of the G. T.R. went aboard and found some rumpus in progress. He urged the men to be quiet, but suggestions of peace but added fuel. R. R. Constable Pat Donovan was with the officer, and the two made an effort to remove two of the men who were the worse for liquor. In the melee seats were smashed and the crowd it is stated pitched upon the authorities. Word was sent to the Belleville police station for two officers and a cab. Meanwhile the handcuffs were put on a man named H. Saunders, who lives near Campbellford, and he was finally removed in spite of the crowd. Another man, W. H. Martin, who had been in the fray, was traced to the baggage car and arrested.  
To court this morning Martin and Saunders were fined \$5 each for having been drunk. They were each given a suspended sentence of six months each and allowed their liberty by giving recognizance for good behavior on charges of resisting officers.  
Crown Attorney Anderson spoke strongly of drunkenness on trains, where the lives of the passengers and the property of the railway might be at stake. Had the local officers not been near a number of people might have been injured.  
Magistrate Masson's opinions coincided with those of Mr. Anderson.
