SUDDEN CALL OF PETERBORO PASTOR

Rev. T. J. Mansell Dies in the Parsonage

Peterboro, Feb. 22—Rev. T. J. Mansell, pastor of Charlotte Street Methodist Church, and well known throughout Ontario, died suddenly at his home this evening.

Shortly after entering the parsonage he was taken with a weak spell and died within half an hour. Dr. F. C. Neal was in attendance, but was unable to save the life of the minister.

Rev. Mr. Mansell was about fifty-five years of age, and came to this city about two years ago from Brantford, where he was pastor of Brant Avenue Methodist Church. The Peterboro church in which he was stationed was the late Senator Cox's church.
