MAY OPERATE CEREAL MILL

ontreal Catholics Must Company Bondholders are Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Curtis More Cheerful

(Special to The Post.) Montreal, Feb. 23-Bondholders of Canadian Cereal and Milling Company met here Friday to consider the report of the receivers, who have had charge of operations for some time.

Receiver Gamchon's report showed that the mills at London, Galt, Ayr, and Fergus have been operated at a profit during the month of January, neighbors. James Roache acted as but that earnings were not as farge as in December. Substantial reductions had been made in expense, and the feeling prevailed that with conservative imanagement and normal conditions, the company could be operated at a fair profit.

The head office may be removed from Toronto to one of the mills. The company's head office, before going into the hands of the receivers, occupied the greater portion of floor in the Lumsden Building, Toronto, Part of this, howeverm has since been sub-let, thereby saving a considerable sum monthly.

Large mills at Tillsonburg, Lindsay and Highgate, Ont, are idle, but may be operated experimentally at a later date. Another meeting will tave place in four weeks, when a further report on the progress of the mills will be heard.

FOUR TECLIPSES DURING 1914


During 1914 there will be four eclipses, two of the moon and two of the sun, and a transit of Mercury over the sun's disk. The annual eclipse of the sun, February 24, 25, is not visible here. A partial eclipse of the moon on March 11th-12th will be seen here between 9 p. m. on March 11th, and 2 p. m. on March 12th. A total eclipse of the sun occurs on August 21st, partially visible here. On September 4th, a partial eclipse of the moon occurs between 4 and 5 a.m., and on November 7th, the transit of Mercury.
