"Market Conditions in Great Britain," was the subject of an address loy Mr. J. A. Ruddick, Dairy land Cold Storage Commissioner, Ottawa, before the last convention of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, He spoke in part as follows;

Great Britain will take all the first class fruit that Canada has to offer, There is no need to look for other miarkets. They can handle all of the apples that we can produce. The larger the quantity, the more notice in taken of it. While all dealers in Great Britain are willing to admit that Canadian apples are best, they do not not always give as much for them as for apples from other countries. Canadians are likely to meet new competition. Large quantities of Tasmanian apples are being put on the English markets, and are meeting with favor from dealers and consum-

"British dealers say that Canadian apples have improved in quality and grade during the past few years. Purchasers have greater confidence in Canadian apples than in American. Our growers should be particular not to misrepresent contents of packages. Apples seldom are sold according to marks on barrels. Merit alone counts. It is a mistake to send packages wrongly marked.

"In respect to selling apples by the CHRISTOPHES CHITTICK, Retired Farmer. auction system, would say that, personally, I would prefer to sell f.o.b. to consigning, although good sales often and made on consignment. It is better to consign to the large centres rather than to inland points, as there is greater competition."

TO DIAGNOSE ANTHRAX.

A suspected case of anthrax (charbon) the diagnosis can be positively confirmed by microscopic examination. A few drops of blood, placed on a clean piece of notepaper, if allowed to thoroughly dry in the air before folding, will furnish sufficient material for diagnostic pur-

In suspected cases of black-leg. (charjon symptomatique), the bloody serum from an affected portion of the animal, prepared in the manner above indicated for anthrax, will furnish material for positive diagnosis. Where it is impossible to exclude

either of the diseases above mentions ed, and it is probable that death is due to one or the other, the placing of a small amount of blood in an equal amount of pure glycerine will enable a positive laboratory diagnosis. A drachin of this blood-glyfcerine preparation is all that is re-

Anthrax pacilli are always abundant in the blood of animals dying from the disease. The Sacilli of the black-leg are found in small numfoers only, but are sufficiently numerous to infect experimental ani-

Glycerine prevents growth of putrefactive bacteria, but does not effect the spores of either anthrax (or black-leg. Full information concerning history, clincal symptoms, etc., should be given.
