EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Toronto Telegram says the friends of cheap power fear that "in placing confidence upon the Whiting government they have been leaning upon a broken reed."

The Whiting government economical? Surely not. Last year it spent \$10,000,000. It claims a surplus of \$600,000, and every dollar came from the succession dues, which Mr. Matheson pronounced, while in opposition, a robbery of the dead.

Montreal Herald: A Separate school trustees in Toronto has resigned because of the lack of interest taken by the ratepayers in the contest by which he was elected. If that idea ever becomes popular in the English wards in Montreal some of them would be permanently without representatives - unless the proceeding taught them a lesson.

That the Canadian Pacific should be late but once in a year in delivering the English mail at Hongkong, is a remarkable achievement. When the contract was made the time was cut so fine that the maximum speed of steamers and trains would have to be maintained throughout the journey across two oceans and a continent to fulfill its term. That this time limit has been overstepped but once, seems, says the Montreal Herald, to accentuate the reliability of the service and the wonderful efficiency of the C. P. R. as a transportation company.

The death of Mr. Justice Killam, chairman of the Dominion Railway Commission, is an event of national importance, and will be deeply regretted. He had made the Commission a force in the community, and by his rare judgment and steady application to the work, done much to improve the transportation facilities of the country and solve many knotty problems connected with the railways. His death comes most inopportune, just when the Government was planning to strengthen the Commission. It is to be feared that Mr. Killam became a martyr to his duties.

The Jamaica Supreme Court has just rendered a somewhat remarkable judgment in the suits against insurance companies for fire losses sustained in the conflagration following the recent earthquake. It is not contended that the conflagration was due to other cause than the earthquake, yet the court gravely finds that the fires preceded the earthquake. This strikes the Monetary Times as being arrived at by a peculiar method of reasoning, and it says: "That, evidently, is according to the law. Common sense would indicate that the earthquake preceded the fire. It is almost a pity that the judicial finding was not 'That the fire was the cause of the earthquake.' There would then have been a new principle on which to work. One writer happily and humorously draws a smile; 'If a criminal in Kingston were to blow up a church full of people, and the victims were found dead, he would evidently have a fair chance of being restored blameless to society if he could give evidence that the people named in the indictment were in doubtful health and not likely to have died whether or not.'

Foster Charged Minister With Theft Compelled to Make Abject Apology

Man Who Juggled With Trust Funds of Widows and Orphans Stands Up and Made to Eat Crow.

The obstruction to the public business of the county by the Conservatives in the House reached a climax recently. From Thursday, at 3 p. m., until midnight Saturday, the House was kept in continuous session. The estimates of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries were before the House, and not one item was allowed to pass. The Opposition, under the leadership of Mr. Foster, passed the time away reading from blue books and making inappropriate comments upon same, varying the monotony by alleging dishonesty on the part of the minister; but, although repeatedly invited to do so, no man dared make a definite charge.

WHAT OBSTRUCTIONISTS DID This is the way the matter stands, Mr. Foster, taking advantage of the absence of his leader, Mr. Borden, organized a deliberate system of obstruction to the business of the House. At the moment the estimates of Marine and Fisheries being under discussion, they provided the object of attack. The inherent weakness and lack of ability in the Opposition was never demonstrated to better advantage than after hour Opposition members arose and occupied the time of the House by reading Government reports, and they did not read them well. There was not a man among them who could speak consecutively for fifteen minutes. Their lack of ability, the impoverished condition of their minds—their ignorance generally—was manifest. There was not a man among them of average intelligence. The House was neither accused, nor instructed, but was perforce compelled to submit to the imposition of having to hear read reports that had already been distributed to, and read by, every member present.

FOSTER IN THREE ACTS Mr. Foster's position during the proceedings may be described in three parts: First—He accused the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of stealing from a vote. Secondly—He made a full and

both actions illegal and both condemned by Royal Commission. He charges prominent Liberals with dishonesty and a desire to supplant each other. This from the leader in Sir MacKenzie Bowell's nest of traitors.

He refers to the public press reflecting the views of the people of Canada as being adverse to the administrative act of members of the Liberal Cabinet. He was himself described by his own party paper as "Judas Iscariot."

HOIST WITH OWN PETARD It is not surprising, therefore, that Geo. E. Foster was found to have been guilty of the very offense charged against the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. When an offense is charged against any person or any department of Government, by Mr. Foster, one has only to examine the records, and Foster bobs up as having done the very thing charged. It was so in this case.

FOSTER'S APOLOGY Having based obstruction upon the ground that the minister had stolen money from a vote, Mr. Foster was confronted with a case in which he had done the very thing charged, particulars of which will be found below. Mr. Foster was thereupon compelled to withdraw the offensive words and apologize to the minister, which he did in these terms: "But I am frank to say that I might have used a word which would be less offensive than the word 'stolen.' I might have used the word 'transferred.' But the meaning I had was exactly the same meaning as if I had used the word 'transferred,' from one vote and used the money for a purpose distinctively not provided. If the Minister objects to it, I will take it back frankly and fully. Looking at it, now that it is in print, it does appear to be a lit-

tle too strong. If I were to say over it again after cool moments I would say "transferred" instead of "stolen." But my honorable friend knows that I did not use the word in that offensive sense of taking the money for his own uses out of a vote, but of taking a sum of money disbursed to one vote, and applying it to another—appropriating it wrongly. I am willing to stand by my statement, but to offer an apology for a too strong word."
