Ops Township's New School Section

Pathmasters, Fence Viewers and Poundkeepers Appointed—Other Business. A regular meeting of Ops Council was held on Monday, March 23rd, with all members present. The minutes of last meeting, on being read by the clerk, were on motion of Messrs. Wilson and Hawkins, confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS, ETC. A letter from the C. P. R. Company, asking opinion of Council in regard to the proposed division of the public highway near Pottery Corner. Report and award of the township engineer on proposed drainage near Hartnett's corner.

A letter from Mr. McNeillie, County Treasurer, enclosing an account of \$1441, being interest on bridge account from Dec. 16, 1907, till paid. Mr. Jas. Johnston, owner n. hf. lot 19, con. 7, asked permission to do his estate labor on the side road north of his land to improve the road and drainage. On motion of Messrs. Hawkins and Coulter, his request was granted.

On motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Coulter, pathmasters, fence-viewers and poundkeepers were appointed to serve throughout the township for the year now beginning.

NEW SCHOOL SECTION. A petition was presented by Messrs. John Arnold and Geo. W. Darke, signed by nineteen ratersayers of School Section No. 3, praying that said section be divided from north to south, and that the east half be formed into a new section, so that children residing therein may have an opportunity of attending school in future, the present schoolhouse being too remote.

Mr. Knight, Public School Inspector, was present and stated that Section No. 3 was a large, rich section, the aggregate assessment of which was the highest in his inspectorate. He divided, each section would still have a higher assessment than other sections in the township. It was well known that some of the children were too far from the schoolhouse to attend regularly, and it was the duty of the Inspector and of the Council, as well as of the ratersayers, to see that every child be enabled to attend school regularly. He was therefore of the opinion that the prayer of the petitioners should be granted, and a new school section formed.

After duly considering the matter, the Council were unanimous in opinion that Section No. 3 should be divided and that the new section formed from the east half should also include all lands assessed for the support of Public schools, north of the 4th line, and east of the centre of the 3rd concession.

The following resolution was then passed: Moved by Mr. Coulter, seconded by Mr. O'Loughlin, that the trustees of Public School Section Nos. 3 and 4 be notified that this Council intend to pass a by-law for the formation of a new school section from the east half of Public School Section No. 3, including also n. hf. lot 21, con. 4, e. hf. 21, con. 3, e. hf. 22, con. 3, now assessed to School Section No. 4, and the s. hf. lot 21, con. 4, now assessed to Lindsay Public schools; that the ratersayers interested be notified, through the local newspapers, to attend a meeting of Council on Monday, April 6th next, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to confer with the Council in regard to the proposed new section.—Carried.

In response to the petition of John A. Bell, J. C. Irwin and others, for drainage on the 5th and 6th cons. of Ops, near Hartnett's corner, the township engineer filed his report and award thereon, March 6th inst. and on motion of Messrs. Wm. H. K. Wilson and Peter Hawkins, the Clerk was instructed to notify all land owners assessed for said drainage, to attend a meeting of Council on Monday, April 6th, 1908, at 10 o'clock a.m. to hear and consider said report in accordance with Drainage Act.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS. O'Loughlin and Coulter.—That the Clerk call for tenders for township printing for the year beginning May 1st next. Hawkins and Wilson.—That the Clerk notify Mr. Wm. I. Reid to pay the cost of survey on 8th con. road at lots 11 and 12, as per agreement.

Wilson and Hawkins.—That the following accounts now passed, be paid, viz., J. R. McNeillie, Co. Treas., interest on bridge account from Dec. 16th, '07, \$1141; P. Kennedy, township treasurer, postage, etc., 1908 and 1907, \$5.88; Jas. Brown, provisions for 1907, \$9.22.

The by-law confirming the appointment of pathmasters, fenceviewers and poundkeepers received the usual readings and was passed, signed and sealed. Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. O'Loughlin, that the Council now adjourn, to meet at 10 o'clock a.m. on Monday, April 6th next, when the Engineer's report on the Hartnett Bridge will be read and considered.—Carried.
