HAS OLD AGE SCHEME

France Will Grant Pensions to Her Aged Workmen.

COMPROMISE WITH SENATE

After Long Opposition Agreement Has Been Reached—Minimum Pension to Be \$72—Workmen to Pay Two Per Cent. of Their Wages—Employers Also Contribute a Like Amount to the Fund.

Paris, March 23.—Finding that the continued opposition of the Senate to the workmen's old-age pension bill, passed by the Chamber in 1906, promised to postpone indefinitely the realization of this social reform which the Radical wing of the French Republic has been promising for years, the Chamber has finally consented to the principle of a compromise, and a law has been passed giving the Government and the Senate that this compromise must become law before the expiration of the present year.

By the terms of the bill workmen contribute two per cent. of their wages and the employers a like percentage during a period of thirty years, thus creating a fund from which the workman thereafter is to receive an annual minimum pension of \$72. The state is to contribute only when the forced savings of the workmen are not sufficient to create a fund large enough to furnish a pension of that amount. Upon the promulgation of the law it is proposed to grant annual pensions to all workmen over sixty who have worked thirty years, and then gradually increase the scale of pensions of those "graduating" each succeeding year until at the end of thirty years all will receive at least \$72. The liability after the scheme is in "permanent" operation is fixed approximately at \$86,000,000. The Chamber has agreed to the principle of absolutely limiting the Government liability for the present to \$26,000,000 annually.

FLEW ALMOST TWO MILES.

Aeroplane Makes Successful Flight Carrying Two Men.

Paris, March 23.—Following a record-breaking performance of thirty in flying a mile and a half in his aeroplane, Henry Farman, Saturday made another spectacular flight at Issy, covering two and a half kilometers, a little less than two miles, in 3 minutes and 21 seconds.

Later, in company with Leon Delagrangue, he entered the "Métier" aeroplane, which moved on the ground at the rate of about 30 miles an hour, and then went into the air making a short, but highly successful flight. This is the first time that an aeroplane carrying two persons, has made a successful flight, and the aeronauts were enthusiastically cheered by thousands of people who had gathered.

Was a Case of Suicide.

(Chatham) March 23.—As the locality was out of his jurisdiction, Coroner E. V. Brayford this city did not conduct the inquest into the death of Fred Maunday, keeper of the St. John's Island, Mitchell Bay. Instead he notified the crown attorney at St. John's, and Coroner Macdonald of that town investigated and finds that Maunday committed suicide. Maunday had been found dead in his home early Friday morning by his wife, with a bullet in his breast.

Foul play was suspected because of feuds existing on the island, which is largely peopled by Indians. Duck hunters from various places have killed many of them. Incendiarism was suspected when several guns were not found among the debris. Then when A. B. Wells of Chatham had his gun returned with the threat to keep quiet or get a bullet in the breast next time he was at Port Dover, matters took a serious turn. It was thought that Maunday, who was weak-minded, might have been a victim.

Tried to Burn Barracks.

Stratford, March 23.—Charged with attempting to set fire to the Salvation Army barracks, Fred Bryant, aged 3, married, was locked up yesterday. He caused consternation on the street by gathering a crowd around him and publicly denouncing the Army, saying that he had been brought out there by the Salvationists and then cast aside. He openly confessed that he had entered the barracks, turned on the gas, flooding the rooms and setting fire to the building in two or three places. The building narrowly escaped destruction on Friday night.

Round Up of Chinese Reformers.

Pekin, March 23.—The authorities on March 17 inaugurated a series of wholesale arrests of reformers and suspected revolutionists, and up to the present time no less than 100 men have been taken into custody. It is reported that four of the prisoners have official rank. Most of the prisoners are men educated abroad.

Hayti is Quiet.

Port au Prince, Hayti, March 23.—President Nord Alexis, in an interview at the palace yesterday, declared that conditions in the republic were absolutely tranquil.

Shot for Seventy Cents.

Norfolk, Va., March 21.—John B. Blayler, a contractor of Lamberts Point, was shot and killed by Henry Hystop in a quarrel over 70 cents.

Troops Attack Natives.

Lisbon, March 21.—An official despatch has been received here to the effect that the Portuguese troops have made an attack upon the revolting natives at Saffueno and Egina, in Portuguese Guinea, and destroyed the town of Yarella.

Fatal Boiler Explosion.

Steuenville, Ohio, March 21.—A boiler in a sawmill on the Abrams farm, near here, exploded yesterday, fatally injuring William Abrams, James Oler and Bert Baker.
