C. L. S. DEFEATS PORT PERRY.

Good Ice.

Burke and Cain, on the wings, excelled themselves last night. They dug right into the game and never let up until the finish. The fans were well pleased with their fine work last night. The Spratt brothers electrified the crowd by their phenomenal work. Talk about speed. Why they went down the ice like a flash with a combination that was wonderfully accurate and effective. Their shooting, too, proved a revelation to the crowd and they fairly chiselled desolation into nets and had the Port Perry goal-tender working overtime to ward off the hot ones. Both figured largely in the scoring column, the other net finders being Killen and Burke.

The Visitors.

The visiting were a husky bunch, very much heavier than the homesters. They were speedy, close checkers, and could use their body to advantage. Lutchell, in goal, is a good man and displayed his worth on many occasions during the evening.
