Syndicate Will Commence Within a Few Days in Most Favorable Locations

The Peterboro Examiner says that boring for oil and gas will be commenced within ten days or two weeks in those parts of North Monaghan which Mr. C. E. Dettman, o Waynesburg considers are the most promising for the products. This it has been learned is practically assured. Mr. Robert Leary, who with Mr. Dettman is interested in the concern, stated to an Examiner reporter that he had secured leases for practically all the desired lands, and those who had been holding out had practically to a man given a leas of their property. Mr. Leary stated that he was sending the welcome news to Mr. Dettman, who had been waiting until all the leases had been secured. It would be a short time until the work was begun, and machinery will be brought here for boring several thousand feet.
