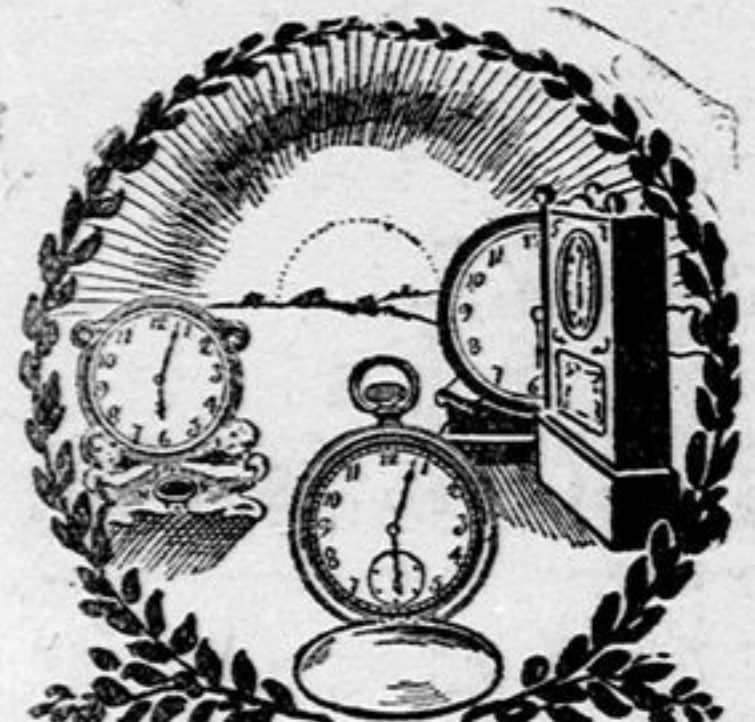

### Coboconk View of Hockey Tourney

Coboconk, March 5.—Mich has been said, and will be said, regarding the final game of the hockey tournament at Fenelon Falls on Friday evening. A dispute has arisen, which your correspondent understand will be settled by a decision of the O. H. A. officials. Coboconk team and supporters want, through the columns of The Post, to give a true view of the way they see things. It seems for this final game between Haliburton and Coboconk, besides the official referee, a judge of play was appointed, by whom it is not known and it appears that it is this party who has caused all the trouble. The half time score was 2-1 in favor of Haliburton.

Shortly after the last half started Coboconk tied the score. With only 3 min. remaining to play Coboconk scored again, making the score, Coboconk 3, Haliburton 2. The referee rind his bell for this goal, the teams all lined up, in the regular way to finish the playing of the 3 minutes remaining, the referee was ready to drop the puck, when the judge of play skated up to him, and told him that some time previous, possibly 5 min. before, he had blown his whistle to stop the game for a rough play. If he blew it, the referee nor neither of the teams heard it. The judge of play claimed that on this account the last goal for Coboconk could not be counted. After some argument the official referee told the scorers to count the goal, and he also told the captain of our team that his first decision would stand, and that the goal would be counted. The judge of play again interferred, this time in the form of a private conversation with the referee. After this consperation, the referee changed his mind, and said it was no goal, and would not be counted. Coboconk then refused to play the remaining three minutes unless the goal was counted, and thus the game ended. In the first place,

it seems as if this were a deep laid scheme to deprive, perhaps better, to rob Coboconk of the honor of having the medals, which were honestly won by them, as the referees' final ruling is not according to any rules of the O.H.A. Secondly, it seems that a referee who is as weak and shallow, and that can be swayed in his decisions as easily as this man can, is not a fit character to referee any game. Thirdly, notice carefully the strenuous methods the judge of play took to stop the game, when he saw the rough play, in a crowd of 500 howling rooters, he blew a small whistle once, Imagine, if you can, the commotion this would cause. If the rough play had been as important as he now makes out, why did he not personally skate to the referee, and have him ring his bell and stop the game, and not wait four or five minutes afterwards, when Coboconk had scored, and then tell of it. Surely had he then wanted he could have made himself heard some way. In the decision the O.H.A. officials may give Coboconk may loose, because of the fact that they failed to play the remaining three min., but they refused to do tgis after the referee had wobbled around in his decision. If the game and medals are finally given to Haliburton, it seems to Coboconk unfair, unBritish and an action absolutely unjustified. Under the existing circumstances, how does it look to the sporting editor of The Post? How does it look to some of the leading hockey enthusiasts of Lindsay. To Coboconk team and their supporters it appears very strongly that the whole thing is an attempt to actually, steal the game and medals from their rightful owners.

Cobocok has a team this year that is noted for its fair, honest playing, Coboconk also has a team that has not suffered a single honest defeat in the season's playing. They are a team that have played hockey and won every game, simply because they were the better players. They have not

been praised in the press, not as much as they should have, perhaps. In short, they have been doing nothing but winning games. Their record shows what they are as hockey players, and some of them are equal to many players in larger town teams. If they had had to meet defeat this year they could have taken it with as much grace as they have every victory. They are not glorying over their season's victory's, but naturally they are proud of their record and the citizens of Coboconk are in turn proud, yes, very proud, of their team.

It matters not, whether or whether not, our boys receive the medals for their victory on Friday night, they, in their own minds, their supporters here, and the majority of spectators who saw the game, are convinced that they won it fairly and honestly. This, to them, is more satisfaction than to own th? medals under the means that Haliburton is using in trying to get them.
