"But aside from the points mentioned, there is positively nothing in that superstition."

March this year came in much more like a lamb than a lion.

March of last year came in with a little touch of both lamb and lion but its exit was altogether lamb-like.

LIKE RAGING LION.

With two inches of snow, low temperature and strong east and north-east winds, March of 1908 came in fiercely enough to represent any lion—and it went out like a lamb.

In 1907, however, March came in quite like a lamb and ended comparatively cold.

THE RECORDS.

Observatory records go to show that March comes in like a lamb much oftener than like a lion.

Recent years in which the March entry was lionlike are—1880, 1881, 1884, 1886, 1887, 1891, 1893, 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897, 1900, 1903, 1906.

In the years 1857, 1868, 1884 and 1886 March came in with a temperature five, four, seven and eleven degrees, respectively below zero.

Library Institute Closes Session

Dr. Vrooman Elected Chairman of Library Institute Committee

The afternoon session of the Lindsay District Library Institute was well attended and great interest was manifested in the working out of the many problems presented frequently in library duties.

MR. NURSEY'S ADDRESS.

Mr. W. R. Nursey, of Toronto was the first speaker of the afternoon, saying that there were eleven districts in the O.L.A., and a meeting had been held in every one but Lindsay and Orangeville. Lindsay is the largest district of the entire ten others and he was sorry that it was not fully represented from its 37 libraries, there being about 25 present. An inspector is appointed to look after the needs of all the libraries, the nature of which were to be ascertained by frequent visits. But as the field to be covered is so large not half of them could be called on in the year. Mr. Nursey suggested that the smaller libraries should be visited at least as they were struggling on the brink and that a committee be appointed to try and devise some plan to help them to a firmer basis, and keep them alive. Ontario gives \$250.00 to each of its 438 libraries if they do sufficient to earn it while the extremely wealthy state of New York donates only \$100.00 apiece to its 450.

The life of a library depends upon the books in possession and then on the circulation of the same. The Government always wishes to know of the municipalities have assisted, and if so will materially aid for modern library is a connection between the public school and the University.

Every year a report and a quarterly bulletin of books is issued by the department and sent to all of the librarians throughout the province. On request a catalogue will go to any library and classify and catalogue the books free of cost. Instruction in simple book binding is also obtainable free and any expense incurred in necessary or advantageous improvement will be equally shared with the library board.

Mr. Nursey was of the firm opinion that correspondence schools should be established in Canada by the Provincial or Dominion government so that people would not be obliged to send to the United States for instruction that could not be conveniently obtained from the university here.

"Regard the department as a friend," said Mr. Nursey in closing his address.

HR. BURNHAM'S TALK

Mr. J. Hampden Burnham was the next speaker and in his witty direct style he showed up the poorly organized state of the districts at present and censured the taking of large sums of money for the erection of libraries throughout the country, from public spirited men such as Mr. Carnegie. This latter stand aroused considerable discussion from the whole institute for they all upheld that it was not begging but that it was the desire of these men to give the money.

Several library representatives were heard from and the critical condition of some disclosed.

CHIEF LIBRARIAN'S ADDRESS

Mr. G. H. Locke, chief librarian of the many Toronto libraries, addressed the audience on "the mission of the public library" in a humorous style that was both interesting and convincing. He said that a library is a perpetual endowment of intellectual opportunity. It should not meet the desires of the community alone, but should suggest that they should read, in other words set the intellectual pace. Time may come when the Lindsay library may serve the surrounding country with a travelling library. The library must have a live board which will look closely after its needs. The open library, where the public can browse upon the books and see the kind in stock is the better one, for picking readable books from a catalogue is very unsatisfactory. It should be a democratic place, there being no favor shown such as placing books aside for friends, because it spoils the whole virtue of the place.

The understanding of English current events is necessary and one of the leading English weekly reviews should be taken for that purpose. Not all the cheap monthly magazines are taken in the Toronto library but the books which are too expen-
