Interesting Lecture by Rev. Jesse Gibson on "From Cape to Cairo"

The annual meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held last evening in St. Andrew's church school room, and it attracted a large number from the different congregations of the town.

His Honor Judge Harding, occupied the chair, and the meeting opened with a reading by Rev. Canon Marsh and prayer by Rev. Mr. Welch.

The feature of the evening was the illustrated lecture by Rev. Jesse Gibson, secretary of the Bible Society entitled "From Cape to Cairo". The lecture was an admirable one, and afforded those who were not fully conversant with the work accomplished by the society an opportunity to learn how the people of the dark continent were having the gospel preached to them. An additional charm was given the lecture by the beautiful views thrown on the canvas, illustrations that depicted scenes and places having direct bearing on the Bible Society's work.

The reverend gentleman's address was intensely interesting and held the undivided attention of the audience to the close.

Have Purchased New Paraphernalia

Local Oddfellows Will Have the Finest Outfit in Canada

Messrs. J. W. Anderson, Geo. Mathie, J. Ashley and W. Staples returned from their trip to the States yesterday in the interests of Lindsay Lodge No. 100, I.O.O.F. On the way they inspected two St. Catharines' lodges which have very fine paraphernalia. From St. Catharines they went to Buffalo, where they met an agent of Henderson and Ames, Kalamazoo, Mich., who had a complete set of samples of actual gowns to pick from. There were about \$5000 worth in all, and no less than 13 entirely new styles were received while the Lindsay deputation were making their choice.

A complete outfit for putting on the dramatized work was purchased. This includes 36 robes, and helmets, among other things. The robes are very beautiful, being of skinner's satin embossed with applied plush and present some very pretty shades.

Wands bearing the emblems of the different offices were purchased as well as a full set of banners. A very fine automatic harp which will play six times was also bought. The total expenditure is in the neighborhood of \$1500.

This will place the Lindsay Lodge far ahead of any in Canada in up-to-dateness and beauty of paraphernalia, in fact the traveller was heard to say that it was the best outfit ever sold by his firm anywhere.

The gowns, etc., will reach here about the first of August when the lodge will start an active membership campaign and will put on a monster degree night for new members sometime during the fall.

Price of Sugar Has Advanced

Advance of 25 Cents a Hundred During Last Ten Days

A most unprecedented state of affairs exists today in the sugar market. On Tuesday the price of sugar advanced 10c. at a bound making a total advance of 25c. a hundred during the last week and a half.

The reason is the peculiar position of the world's sources of supply. It seems the sugar crop of the West Indies on which Great Britain depends for her wants, is a total failure. British merchants had therefore to seek other sources of supply and have been trying to buy up the Cuban sugar market which usually goes to the States.

New York dealers have been endeavoring to keep down the price as much as possible but the English firms crept in and bought up all they could before the Americans awoke to the fact. Then, of course, owing to competition and shortage of supply, the advances took place. The total shortage is estimated at over a quarter of a million tons.

The cost of the undertaking is estimated at about \$6000 which includes a bridge over Emily Creek.
