Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

NELSON SHIELDS FOR SCHOOLS ARE NO CHARGES OR CONDITIONS

We are authorized to state that Rt. Hon. Lord Strathcona's Nelson shield has been offered by Rev. Alfred Hall, of Toronto, to each of the schools in the Victoria inspectorate. There are no charges or conditions. The British and Foreign Sailors' society, which received the "Victory" copper from the Lords of the British Admiralty, has undertaken the expense of mounting, engraving, and distributing these historic shields, and only asks some voluntary contribution to reimburse them, and aid their Sailors' Institutes for men of the royal navy, merchant ships, etc., in Canada and all over the world.

These Nelson shields are highly valued for their patriotic and educational uses in the universities, colleges and schools where they are already placed.

Private colleges and schools are eligible to receive the Nelson shield, and should apply for them.

Aged as the venerable High Commissioner for Canada is, he has a gleam in his eyes that penetrates the future; and as the future of any people is wrapped up in its youth, Lord Strathcona has, of late, had the youth of Canada much in mind. This is seen in many ways. His benefactions to McGill and other educational bodies, his munificent gift for physical culture, and his part in a GREAT EDUCATIONAL MOVEMENT

which is just now crystallizing into definite form, by the arrival of the representative of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society in Toronto, which is to be the headquarters of the Nelson shield scheme, all go to prove his many sided interest. When the plan of making up the metal from Lord Nelson's ships into commemorative and competitive shields for schools was brought to his notice, seeing instantly how such a trophy would serve educational ends of the highest sort, Lord Strathcona gave \$5,000, that many of the schools of the Dominion may obtain this trophy which is of such historic interest. He hopes that annually a paper may be written on a sailor subject, which will be of educational and

of Canada; and that the shield will be presented on prize day, and held by the successful scholar for the year. It was clearly not only the naval glory of Nelson's career, but the great lessons of contemporary history that Lord Strathcona had in mind. When he received the first of the special shields struck for Canadian schools at the Mansion house, London, he said: "It would be difficult to think of a greater service to the British Empire than to have the thought of its sons and daughters annually directed to the sea, its sailors and its ships, and what the nation owes to its brave sons."

EDUCATIONAL AND NON-MILITARY

is the supreme note. The shields are made of pure Nelson copper from the "Victory," and the "Foudroyant" without alloy. They are works of art. On the upper corkers are the oak and maple leaf. In the upper centre is a representation of the "Victory" under full sail. In the lower centre is a bust of Lord Nelson, on one side of which is his immortal signal, and on the other the date of Trafalgar Day. At the bottom upon the scroll, are the following words: "Made of copper from the H. M. ships 'Victory' and 'Foudroyant' presented by Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, G.C.M.G., through the British and Foreign Sailors' Society, for Canadian schools." The letters, "E. R. VII" were added by His Majesty's command, when the copper taken from the Victory in her recent accident was devoted to the purposes of the society.

The Climax Coming

An opera founded upon "The Song of the Soul" in "The Climax," has been chosen by Mr. Joseph Weber. Joseph Carl Briel, an organist in a fashionable Fifth Avenue church is to compose the music. Mr. Briel, since composing the incidental music of "The Climax" has been approached by several managers with flattering offers for his work, the only one of these so far considered has been from Mr. Weber. REGARDING THE SHIPMENT OF DOGS

Local Grand Trunk Officials Receive Important Regulations

The G.T.R. officials here have received notice that they are to receive no dogs shipped from points west of the eastern boundary of York, and Simcoe counties, and no dogs are to be received for shipment to points west of these districts. This precaution is taken, owing to the fact of rabies being prevalent in the western part of the province, and it is hoped by this precaution to prevent its further spread.

The contractors are Messrs. Buchanan and Bishop, and the appropriation is between \$60,000, and \$70,000.

Disorderly Youths Were Fined

Created a Disturbance in Oakwood Last Saturday Night

(Special to The Post.) Oakwood, March 19.—Mr. F. D. Moore, K. C.; county police magistrate, visited our village Friday, when four of our young men were up before him on a charge of creating a disturbance on Saturday night at 11.30 o'clock by screaming and singing on the streets. It appeared that they each had a couple of horns and that their favorite ditty was: "We're here because we're here, We're here because we're drinking beer."

The music was not to the taste of the village constable, who got up out of bed and came down street, and dispersed them. The village authorities are determined to put down that sort of thing, and laid the information. The magistrate found all guilty and fined them \$2 and costs each. He significantly remarked that if it occurred again, there would be no \$2 fine. Mr. G. H. Hopkins appeared for the prosecution, Mr. L. V. O'Connor for the defendants.

Corrections Demanded from Papers Publishing the Ghost Story

Peterboro, March 18.—The Cavan ghost which was featured recently in a Toronto paper has been exploded to a considerable extent by Fred and Charlie Johnston, Cavan, a few miles from Peterboro, on which the apparition appeared. The story in the Toronto paper was printed in the Examiner and Review of this city. Today Fred and Charlie Johnston called on Mr. G. N. Gordon, solicitor, and wanted to know what action could be taken to recover damages, stating that fully one-half of the report was pure fabrication.

To the Globe correspondent they admitted seeing a strange figure in white without any head, but could not say whether it was a ghost or what it was. The whole may be a practical joke. On the advice of Mr. Gordon, the Johnstons demanded a correction of the statements which the local papers agreed to.

Lindsay Man In Oklahoma

Mr. J. C. Scully, is One of the Self Made Men in That State

(Haskell, Oklahoma, Exchange) In writing historical sketches to be identified with our city's early days there is no personage more interesting than J. C. Scully, who is one of Haskell's most prominent business and industrial leaders, an active man in every sense of the word.

Mr. Scully was born in Lindsay, Ontario, Canada, of Irish parentage. At the age of twenty he went to North Dakota. While in that territory he engaged in farming on an extensive scale. He resided there ten years, but owing to the rigid climate, concluded to embark on Oklahoma. His first stop was at Weatherford, in the western part of the state. At this point he began his career as a real estate man, starting the Scully Real Estate Exchange. Endowed with that essential element, he was successful and later became a director in the National Exchange Bank of that city. After remaining there five years he moved to Oklahoma City. There he incorporated the Scully Land Co., which is still in existence.

After about two years with the knowledge that a move to this locality was a betterment of conditions, he planted his stake here, which at that time was a vast prairie used for a stock range. This was in 1904 and Haskell was an unknown quantity. Mr. Scully was one of the few men to see into the future of that prairie, he was sure of its development. Upon his arrival he opened up a townsite office, after which he took into his confidence a few staunch friends and began a banking business. It is said by some of his intimate friends his first book accounts were kept on a grocery sack. However, business increased, and a safe was ordered. Because of the inconvenient facilities in transportation the safe was delayed for a time, during which period the bank officials divided the funds into thousands so that if a holdup occurred, at least a part of the capital would be intact. Soon conditions changed, and the First Bank of Haskell began to transact a lucrative business. Today, Mr. Scully retains stock in this institution. Some time after having located here, the Midland Valley railroad was built and the townsite on which our city stands was platted.

Possessing superior judgment and practical knowledge in real estate values, he took charge of the sale of all townsite lots and to him may be accredited the rapid growth of our little city from infancy to its present proportions. He has been identified with every public measure inaugurated, and has aided in every legitimate scheme to build up Haskell and make it an influential business centre.

Mr. Scully left North Dakota for a trip to his former Canadian home, and while there he was married to

Miss Mary Mathews. To this union nine children were born, seven of whom are still living. They are as follows: Miss Edith, who at present is in Cleveland O., attending school. Florence is in Muskogee, also at school, Veronica, Anna, Agnes, Helen and Jeroline are at home.

His home life has been an example to the most devoted, never forgetting even in his active business career his duty to his home and family.

Strong personality has made him many influential friends in all sections of this country, many of whom have enviable national reputations. In his investments he acquired land in such good oil producing sections as Bald Hill, Haskell, Glen Pool, and Hamilton Switch Oil Fields, and has by shrewd manipulation disposed of leases on said land at good bonuses.

At present he is the president of the Union Land & Investment Co., incorporated, and vice president of the Mid-Continent Oil Co., and engaged in the real estate business and is pushing the sale of town lots in his splendid residence addition to our city.

He predicts a great future for Haskell. Taking into consideration all natural resources of this country he thinks this country will reach a population of 5,000 within the next decade.

Mr. Scully is practically a self-made man and his success may be looked upon as phenomenal. He takes a hand in all public affairs to push Haskell to the front. To say that he is an ideal citizen, a shrewd business man, an excellent neighbor and a man of honor is expressing the sentiments of every element in this city and vicinity.
