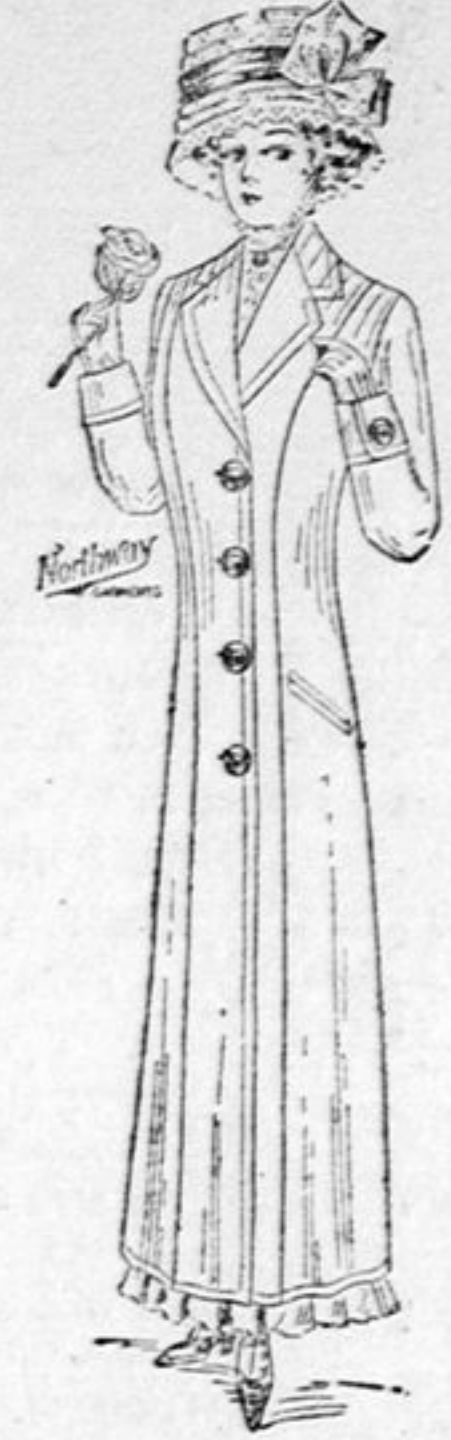

## JUDGMENT RESERVED IN BANK CASE TRIED MONDAY BEFORE JUSTICE CLUTE

Mr. Justice Clute, yesterday afternoon reserved judgment in the case of Mr. Johns, of Nestleton, v. Standard Bank. The hearing of the evidence in the case took up all the afternoon, and the Court room was filled with interested listeners.

This was a case brought by Mr. Johns to recover from the Standard Bank the sum of twenty-eight hundred dollars, being the amount of a cheque drawn by Johns in favor of the Standard Bank on his account with the Farmers Bank on the 16th of December, for which the Standard Bank gave Johns a pass book and credited him with the amount of the cheque. The cheque was then put through for collection on the 17th of December to the Farmers Bank, and when it came to the clearing house to be cleared the Farmers Bank had suspended payment and the Standard Bank received no money for the cheque and thereupon notified Johns that they had received no money for the cheque and asked him to deliver up the pass-book for the amount of his deposit with the Standard Bank which he did, and agreed to assume his original position with the Farmers Bank. He afterwards repudiated his position, and brought action to recover the full amount of the deposit.

## TWO MORE MUST FACE A TRIAL

W. S. Morden and Matthew Wilson, K.C., Committed in Connection with Farmers' Bank Case

Toronto, Mar. 14.—W. S. Morden and Matthew Wilson, K.C., were committed for trial to-day by Magistrate Denison, the charge being that they conspired with W. R. Travers so that the Trusts & Guarantee Co. might get a preference over other creditors in anticipation of the Farmers' Bank smash.

A week ago the case was adjourned in order that the magistrate might consider authorities. What Travers had done was an indictable offense, and His Worship thought if persons conspired with him to do an indictable offense, from which they would profit, they should also be liable. He did not say this morning that he had no further doubt, but he said that he thought the evidence was sufficient to warrant sending the defendants to trial.

## DRIVEN BY FIRE TO ICY STREETS

Thirty-Six Toronto People Have an Unpleasant Experience in the Early Morning

Toronto, Mar. 14.—Thirty-six people were driven from their homes by flames at 2.30 this morning, when a fire, which broke out from some unknown cause in the kitchen of Mr. William Cox's home at 912 King Street west, spread with such rapidity that very few of the inmates were given an opportunity to do more than grab up their clothes and run for the street. No person was injured, but the whole Cox family left their house wearing no more than the garments they had on at the time the fire started in the middle of the night, not even taking time to protect their feet from the icy pavements.

The other three houses damaged were at 915, occupied by the family of Mr. William Priday; 917, occupied by Mr. Frank P. Lee; and 919, occupied by a Polish family, Mr. John Dochshny. The loss will run into several thousand dollars. The bulk of houses is owned by Mr. McHenry, and it is understood are fully covered by insurance. Little insurance was carried by the occupants.

## SEKS A FORTUNE

Illinois Man Looking for Valuable Documents at Kingston

Kingston, Ont., Mar. 14.—Alexander Hamilton, of Edison, Illinois, through local parties, is endeavoring to secure the necessary family history that will enable him and his sister to secure a hundred thousand dollar estate in England, left by an aunt. The required birth certificates of the brother and sister cannot be located, but the certificate of the death and burial of the father, John James Hamilton, which took place here in 1866, has been found. The family left here for Ireland in 1867.

## OBJECTS TO DAM

Kingston, Ont., Mar. 14.—The city council, in connection with the proposal to construct the Long Sault dam, has placed itself on record as being opposed to any works which would interfere with the navigation and future developments of the River St. Lawrence.

## TICK FEVER ABATING

Additional Territory Released From Quarantine in Cattle Country

Washington, Mar. 14.—Nearly 11,000 square miles of additional territory has been released from the federal quarantine for Texas fever, or tick fever, of cattle, by an order of the Secretary of Agriculture, taking effect March 15. The total area released from quarantine since the first quarantine of the tick was successfully undertaken in the summer of 1906, by co-operation between federal, state, and local authorities, now amounts to nearly 140,000 square miles.

## TO SUCCEED REID

Washington, Mar. 14.—That Secretary of the Navy Meyer will succeed Whitelaw Reid as ambassador to Great Britain in the near future, it reported at the State Department to-day. No confirmation of the rumor can be obtained as practically all the officials of the government are absent from the capital.

Mr. Taft sent the medal back at the request of the railwaymen. They submitted it to jewelers here, who pronounced it to be 24 carat gold. The convict alleged to have engraved it denied having done so.
