LIQUOR CASE HEARD IN POLICE COURT BARTENDER AND TWO LISTERS ON TRIAL

(From Wednesday's Post.) At the police court this morning, Frank Oliver, bartender at the Benson House, was charged with selling liquor to parties on the prohibited list on or about March 11th.

Oliver pleaded not guilty to the charge and Mr. G. H- Hopkins, K.C. who was acting in the interests of the License Department, asked for an adjournment for a week, and in the meantime he would lay an information against the proprietor.

Magistrate Jackson said he had heard a great many complaints Sun ainst the accused, and if he was guil ty of infractions of the law he would have to take his medicine.
