HEROIC ACTION OF TWO CITIZENS TO RECEIVE SUITABLE RECOGNITION

It begins to look as if the heroic action of Messrs. C. L. Primeau and Fred Oliver in saving the two Ware children from a watery grave last Christmas Day will be recognized by the Carnegie Hero Commission.

Principal Rogers, of the Separate School, appeared before the Town Council last night in reference to the matter and explained the facts in connection with the heroic act.

Our readers will remember the facts in connection with the case. The little children were playing on the river at the foot of Ridout-st., on Christmas morning when the ice broke from under them and they were precipitated in the water. Mr. J. L. Primeau saw the children's plight from the C.P.R. train passing at the time and immediately jumped from the car and ran to their rescue. He broke the ice and bravely swam out in the river water, rescuing one of the children. Mr. Fred Oliver also bravely saved his life by plunging into the river, and succeeded in rescuing the other boy.

Mr. Rogers said that citizens had nothing but words of praise for the heroic action of the two gentlemen, and he had written the secretary of the Carnegie Hero Fund in Pittsburgh concerning the matter. The official had forwarded a form which he wished to be filled in. Mr. Rogers had completed with the request and asked the Council to pass a resolution endorsing his action. He felt that the bravery of the two men should be recognized.

Mayor Wood assured Mr. Rogers that the matter would receive due attention. It was a worthy object and he was pleased to see Mr. Rogers as a citizen taking such an active interest in the matter and the Council would do its best to see that the act received proper consideration.

EXAMPLE OF THE BONUS SYSTEM

(From the Edmonton Journal.) A proposal recently made by the Mayor of Lethbridge served as a "horrible example" for those who are in the habit of dwelling on the evils of the bonus system.

Some years ago the city induced a woollen manufacturing establishment to locate within its borders. It has proven a sinkhole for the city's money, with the returns practically nothing.

The situation at present is that the municipality has the building and plant on its hands. The expense of watchmen and fuel has been mounting up, while the mill has been idle, and the mayor now suggests that the machinery be taken down and stored in the upper storey, while the lower could be used as a civic warehouse and repair shop.

Such a condition of things has arisen frequently in the east, where communities have been led by promoters who worked on local rivalries to get what they wanted. The bonus principle is unsound, and it is under the most exceptional circumstances that there is any justification in resorting to it.

MR. BORDEN AND THE NAVY

Two short years ago Mr. Borden vigorously opposed the action of the Liberal government in the matter of a Canadian navy, asserting that this action was utterly inadequate in force and form. The proposal of the government involved the construction of a Canadian squadron of eleven vessels fitted for coast defence, and ready to co-operate in the most loyal and hearty way for the maintenance and honor of the Empire.

The House at that time unanimously resolved that it was the duty of the people of Canada as they increase in numbers and wealth to assume a large measure of responsibility for national defence. Mr. Borden was not satisfied with this, but went on to move: "That, in the meantime, the immediate duty of Canada, and the impending necessity of the Empire, can best be discharged and met by placing, without delay, at the disposal of the Imperial authorities, as a free and loyal contribution from the people of Canada, such an amount as may be sufficient to purchase or construct two battleships, or armored cruisers of the latest Dreadnought type, giving to the Admiralty full discretion to expend the said sum at such time and for such purpose as in their judgment may best serve to increase the united strength of the Empire, and thus assure it peace and security."

This was his formal public pronouncement on the naval question. The Nationalists say boldly he promised them that if elected, he would repeal the naval bill and give no money for Dreadnoughts. He has not announced this policy to his Ontario

OBITUARY

MICHAEL FLYNN

ARCHBISHOP SPRATT WITHDRAWS PROHIBITION

Standard: The ladies at the head of the "Land of Golden Dreams," the amateur Pantomime being rehearsed in the city under the auspices of the Daughters of the Empire, received something of a shock Friday when told that Archbishop Spratt had ordered the seventy-five Roman Catholic children who had been rehearsing for various parts to drop out of the performance on account of it being Lent. The Archbishop's decision would have made a considerable difference in the amount of the receipts if the Roman Catholics were prevented from patronizing the production next week and the effort to raise a sum of money for the purpose of establishing a retreat for tubercular children would probably have resulted in a failure.

When the matter was put before the Archbishop in this light and he was assured that the proceeds would be devoted to charity, his Grace was quickly won over, and he decided to grant a special dispensation on Sunday to allow the children to take part in the performance and also a special dispensation to allow all Roman Catholics to patronize the production.

SCHOOL CHANGES AT THE FALLS

Gazette: In accordance with a suggestion made to the school board at a recent meeting by Messrs. A. A. Cameron and D. Robertson, the Board has decided to rearrange and improve the grading of the existing classes at the schools, and has arranged for a continuation class teacher to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Miss Cowles.

The south ward school, it is understood, will be used exclusively for

continuation work, and the north ward for other classes. The change will obviate the necessity of resident pupils going to Lindsay Collegiate, and among other advantages there will be a saving of some \$400 by reason of the increased grants, due to the higher grading of the school.

MIDLAND MAN USED GASOLINE

Montreal, Feb. 29.—An official statement issued at C.P.R. headquarters announces that the opening of navigation Port McNicoll and not Owen Sound will be the headquarters of the C.P.R. upper lake fleet. The great lakes fleet comprises five steamers, and a five-day service every week will be put on between Port McNicoll and Port William. Only one call a week will be made at Owen Sound.
