G. H. HOPKINS, K.C., WRITES COUNCIL REGARDING THE CAREW CO. S TAXES

A letter was read at last night's session of the council from Mr. G. H. Hopkins, K. C., in connection with the taxes of the Carew Lumber Company. The circumstances in connection with this matter are familiar to our readers, as it was threshed out at a lengthy session of the council in December, 1911. In the summer of 1908, after the destruction of the Carew mills by fire, the council arranged a fixed assessment on the property.

They do so at their own expense. The letter stated further that the council was not personally liable, and Mr. Hopkins said he would only be too glad to defend any such action. LETTER TO TAX COLLECTOR. Mr. John Jackson, tax collector, received the following letter from Mr. G. H. Hopkins, K. C., on the matter:— The John Carew Lumber Co., Limited, inform us that you have threatened to distraint for certain taxes. They have paid all the taxes for which they are liable, and if you distraint, an action will be brought against you personally, and we will see that you pay the costs personally, if you take proceedings without direct instructions.

COUNTY POLICE COURT CASE TODAY MAN'S DAUGHTER WAS DETAINED

This morning a session of county police court was held with Magistrate Moore presiding. A well known Fenelon township man was charged with fraudulently detaining in his house out of the possession, and against the will of her father, a young lady under twenty-one years of age. The detention occurred on Monday, March 3rd. Mr. G. H. Hopkins, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. Thos Stewart for defendant. Mr. Stewart asked for an adjournment until tomorrow (Thursday) at 9.30 a. m., which was granted. It is understood that the case has a religious aspect. The young lady in question has become, it is alleged, a believer in the doctrines advocated by the well known Fenelon township man, at whose house, it is claimed, she spent Monday. The young lady's father is opposed to having his daughter stay at the man's house, and is therefore taking legal proceedings to endeavor to compel her to return home.

QUESTION OF PUBLIC TOBOGGAN SLIDE IS LEFT OVER UNTIL NEXT FALL

At the council meeting last night the committee appointed to consider the question of a public toboggan slide was asked to report. Ald. Nicholls, who was chairman of the committee, confessed that he had overlooked the question. He thought it was too late now to deal with the matter, but promised that the committee would take it up in the fall. Mayor Beal said this question was brought up the first of the year. Reeve Kylie said two members of the committee lived in the east ward. Let them look at McDonald's hill at the foot of York-st. as a site for the slide. A temporary fence could be placed in position on the wharf to protect the tobogganists from the river. His Worship Mayor Beal said this matter came up at the first council meeting, and was a most important one. There had been a good deal of talk, besides money spent, in getting people to come to the town. It would be wisdom also to spend a little to keep people here. Almost every town is considering questions of this nature. The town of Uxbridge was providing a free skating and curling rink for its people. Ald. Nicholls suggested making arrangements with the rink management for an afternoon for the children of each ward to enjoy a free skate. Ald. Warren said the free slide was a first class idea, but the rink proposition would be an expensive one. Open air rinks, such as they have at the east ward schools, was a splendid feature. Mayor Beal said the town hall and council chamber should be free to any gathering of young people who wished to enjoy it. Mr. Corley had built a slide in the northern part of the town, which was very much appreciated. The committee should act on Reeve Kylie's suggestion. Ald. Irvine—Let the committee meet and take the matter up.

SCHOOL BOARD'S REQUEST GRANTED COUNCIL WILL PURCHASE PROPERTY

A special meeting of the council was held last night to deal with the requests of the Board of Education that the council raise by the issue and sale of debentures the sums of \$850.00 and \$1,800 for the purchase of additional playground space for the Central School and Collegiate Institute respectively. The matter came up at the regular meeting Monday night, but the members of the council decided to hold it over until last night. A special session was called for seven o'clock, but at the hour of eight o'clock only six members were on hand—His Worship Mayor Beal, Dep.-Reeve Dobson and McWatters, and Ald. Smale, Naylor and Adams. His Worship Mayor Beal, and Messrs. Dobson and McWatters were in favor of an adjournment until such time as a full attendance of the members of the council should be secured. Mr. McWatters stated that the business before them was of considerable importance, and it was not fair to shoulder the responsibility on some half dozen members. Those who were most anxious to have the question taken up in special session failed to attend the meeting. It looked like an adjournment, but Ald. Smale said that the members present were gathered to do the business of the town. The indifference of council members in attending meetings had always been a source of trouble, but the question before them was an urgent one, and it should be dealt with. Ald. Smale and Adams therefore moved that the request of the Board of Education be acceded to re the purchase of that portion of the Murphy estate which the School Board had had leased for playground space for the past thirty years, for \$850. His Worship Mayor Beal was not in favor of putting the motion until he knew the life of the option held by the School Board on the property. The information was given by Ald. Smale and Naylor that the option expired in twenty-four hours. The motion was then put and carried, Messrs. Naylor, Smale, Adams and McWatters supporting it. Dep.-Reeve Dobson did not vote. The request of the School Board re the Brown property for a Collegiate campus was laid over until a full attendance of the council could be secured.

SCHOOL BOARD WANTS \$10,000 FOR NEW SCHOOL IN SOUTH WARD

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held last evening in the council chamber, with the following members present: Messrs. J. D. Flavelle, A. Jackson, T. Stewart, T. A. Fisher, John Anderson, J. B. Begg, A. L. Campbell and Drs. White and Blanchard. Owing to the illness of Secretary Spier his place was taken by Mr. W. E. Agnew. It was moved by Dr. White and seconded by Mr. Jackson that the Management Committee attend to the framing of the pictures which have been purchased out of the government grant. Moved by Mr. Jackson and seconded by Dr. White, that the usual grants of \$50 for chemistry supplies, \$50 for the library and \$25 for decorative purposes be made.—Carried. In explanation of these amounts it might be stated that they are obligatory in order to obtain the government grant. Messrs. W. Flavelle and Judge Harding were appointed as the Board's representatives on the Public Library Board. Messrs. J. D. Flavelle and A. L. Campbell were granted three months' leave of absence for their trip around the world. Mr. W. H. Stevens was re-appointed to the Board of Entrance examiners. The report of the Finance Committee was read and adopted. Moved by Mr. Campbell and Dr. White, that the Town Council be asked to issue debentures for \$10,000 for the erection of a new public school in the south ward. The school will probably be a four room one.—Carried unanimously. The Board adopted a resolution to the effect that the Board and the Town Council have a joint meeting, and discuss the feasibility of allowing town pupils to attend the Collegiate Institute for the first year free of charge. The Board does not wish it understood that they are committed to the policy, but in view of the fact that the matter has been discussed a great deal lately, they would like the opinion of the council on the matter. The question of the salaries of public school teachers was touched upon and will be taken up at a subsequent meeting. A number of towns and cities in Ontario have lately raised the minimum and maximum salaries. A special committee was appointed to interview the Town Council at an early date regarding the building of a south ward school. Mr. W. E. Agnew was appointed to act as secretary during the illness of Secretary-Treasurer Spier. The Board expressed the hope that Mr. Spier would soon recover his usual good health. During the evening the matter of additional land being purchased as playground for the L.C.I. and Central Schools was referred to. Mr. Begg expressed himself as being unalterably opposed to the purchase of the land. He thought they had plenty. In explanation it was stated that the inspector's report called for more land. A special committee was appointed to look into the matter of certain accounts re the new schools.
