During the past few years the Seed Branch has been endeavoring to effect improvement in the seed trade educational work with farmers and seed dealers, supplemented by the enforcement of the Seed Control Act. With few exceptions, both the wholesale and retail dealers have endeavored to conduct their business in conformity with the law, which has made it possible to keep hairs with dread, for they were most | the number of prosecutions very low, This season it has been exceedingly difficult for seedsmen to collect sufficient stocks of high grade seed, owing to the very short crop, and the trade will doubtless present many unusual and trying features. Under these somewhat adverse conditions, your best efforts to observe the provisions of the Act will be required. All timothy, red clover, alsike and alfalfa seed must be graded and marked Extra No, 1, No, 1, Nol 2, or No. 3, according to equality.
