

REPORT OF DEPUTATION FROM BARRIE ON INSPECTION OF PERMANENT ROADS

The committee delegated by the Barrie town council to visit Detroit with a view of recommending a permanent pavement for Bradford street returned to Barrie on Saturday and reported that they had inspected the various roads as follows:-

VITRIFIED BRICK-A great number of streets were paved with brick which is constructed with a base of from 5 to 6 inches of concrete mixed in the proportion of 1-3-5, on the bases is laid a sand cushion of about 1 inch, on this is laid the vitrified bricks or blocks, and the joints flushed with a cement grout. This is a very popular pavement and has given good satisfaction, but great care has to be taken in the selection of the bricks. The pavement is one of the noisiest and where an inferior brick has been used soon makes rather a rough street. The average cost of laying this pavement can be put at \$2.70 per sq. yd.

CREOSOTE BLOCKS - This pavement is used more particularly for heavy traffic and is considered one of the best pavements that it is possible to lay. It consists of a concrete base with 1 inch cushion of sand or other material upon which are laid the treated wood blocks. The street has a splendid appearance

CONCRETE. - The committee inspected a great number of concrete roads in Wayne county and the city and passable roads by drawing wood. of Detroit, and the opinion was that the concrete road answered the purpose as well as any of the other roads, was of a pleasing appearance and after several years of traffic, home. On account of the roads and showed no signs of wear or rather any wear there might have been was so evenly distributed over the surface as to show not the faintest sign of a rut or unevenness. The road is hard or harder than the ordinary concrete sidewalk and of sufficient roughness to afford a good foot hold for the horses' hoofs; the motor traffic has apparently no injurious effect and from the opinions gathered the life of the road could be placed to Mount Horeb cemetery.

The construction of this is from 5 to seven inches of concrete mixed 1-2-4 and worked to the required shape of the road, great care must be taken in the selection of the materials, and that they are mixed in the right proportions, the spreading must be done by men well up in the work, and every precaution taken to insure an even and thorough mix. Expansion joints are constructed every twentyfive feet in the same manner as the reinforced concrete and great care taken in their construction. The cost of this road varies very greatly according to the material and local conditions. Inquiries into the cost of the various localities where it has been constructed shows a run of from 87 cents by day labor to \$1.43. by contract. Taking into consideration the local conditions in Barrie, the estimated cost of the concrete road is \$1.25 as an almost outside.
