The numbers and series on the bogus ten dollar bills are 446,001 to 447,000, series D: 492,000 to 493,000, series A. B. C. and D; 534,001 to 585,000, series C; 582,001 to 585,000, series C and D.

On the five dollar bills the numbers and series are: 802,001 to 803,000 series A. B. C. and D; 814,001 to 815,-000, same series; 824,001 to 825,000, same series, 827,001 to 825,000, same series; 829,001 to 830,000, same series.
