THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK GOOD.

The subjoined announcement of trade conditions in Montreal by the Witness is an encouraging sign of business revival. The same story is being heard from Toronto and the other manufacturing centres of this province. If the spring opens up well in April, so that seeding may be commenced early in the Northwest confidence will be restored to a large extent, and orders will flow freely to older Canada for its manufactured products. The manufacturer who kept "plugging away" during the winter will then have the advantage in being able to fill (orders promptly. The Witness says;

The business outlook in Canada at the present time is of the most enpouraging nature. Spring orders for merchandise are coming in from all over the Dominion, and while these are limited as to the quantity for delivery, the sales are being made largely on a cash basis. Factories and mills are commencing to make up for lost time by taking back employes who have been laid off during the past winter. Locally this is shown in a large number of industries which are now running on full time, with prospects of langely inoreased business. Another factor worthy of mention is the large amount of dividend money to be distributed by banks, corporations, and industrial concerns, during the next month or six weeks, to their thousands of sharehilders throughout the A conservative estimate places this dividend figure at between \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000. This money will, no doubt, be immediately placed in circulation, and it will do its part in stimulating trade, especially in the retail arena. Happily for Canada, the labor horizon is fairly bright, as there are at present, except among the Quebec longshoretween capital and labor.
