While in certain cases, cadets stay several years at educational institutions, still it is felt that a closer attention to renewals in the officers cadres of cadet corps would be advantageous to all concerned. Officers, commanding commands and independent districts will take steps accordingly, and in cases where over three years have elapsed since officers appeared in Minitia Orders, will enquire if new officers do not need to be appointed. 
