Bowles -- Workman



Something like one hundred and forty tons of hay was shipped into Coboconk during the past winter for

purposes of feed. That goes to show just how scarce "native grown" hay and other fodder was during the winter.

Mr. J. A. Ham, of Ham & Sons, merchants, of Coboconk, was in town this morning for a few hours, and in conversation with The Evening Post remarked upon the large quantity of hay it had been found necessary to bring in. For the most part cattle in that section of country were looking fairly well, much better than many other places, and it was expected that as there would soon be lots of pasture, no further loss or expense would be incurred. He expressed the opinion that everything points to this year being a good one for hay and grains, with a consequent good year for cattle.


