



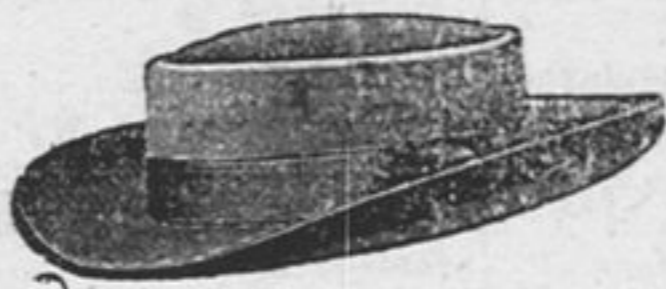

 TORONTO, April 21.—Receipts of stock as reported by the railways, were 84 carloads, composed of 12,668 cattle, 1747 hogs, 123 sheep, 903 calves and 2 horses.
Exporters.
 Not many on sale, but a few were reported at 34, that is, for pickled lots. Prices ranged from 35 to 40 for export steers, and 34 to 35 for export bulls.
Butchers.
 Choice picked lots of butchers sold at 28 to 29; loads of good, 25 to 26; medium mixed loads of butchers and good cows, 24 to 25; good cows, 24 to 25; common to fair cows, 22 to 24; canners and rough cows, 15 to 20 per cwt.
Feeders and Stockers.
 Stockers and feeders are beginning to be offered in larger numbers. H. & W. Murby reported having got 120 cattle in these classes, at the following prices: Stockers, 60 to 700 lbs., sold at 23 to 24; steers, 700 to 900 lbs., 22 to 24; canners and rough cows, 15 to 20 per cwt., according to quality.
Milkers and Springers.
 A moderate supply of milkers and springers sold from 30 to 35 each, and one of extra quality brought 30.
Veal Calves.
 Deliveries were the largest of the season thus far, over 300 being reported. The quality generally was very poor; in fact, one of the largest dealers stated that 40 per cent. of the calves on sale would not

pass inspection at the auctioneers' were lower, being quoted by Mr. Dunn, the largest buyer, at 28 to 32 per cwt. for the bulk. Had there been any good to choose calves they would have brought more money. Amongst the lot we did not see one real prime new milked calf.

Sheep and Lambs.
 Receipts of sheep and lambs were light, with prices very firm for any of good quality. Export ewes, 15 to 18 1/2; ram, 14 to 15; good yearling lambs sold from 21 to 24, and prime quality at 24 to 26; common lean back lambs, 15 to 16 per cwt.; spring lambs, 23 to 25 each, with some little scraggy fellows, that ought to be with their mothers, that were almost unsalable. These small lambs reflect on the poor judgment of the farmers and drovers in not keeping them on the farm.

Hogs.
 Over 1700 hogs were reported by the railways, as having arrived from all sources, about 1200 of which came on the market. Mr. Harris reported prices unchanged at 24.50 for select, fed and washed, and 24 1/2 for lights.
