

to choice calves they would have brought more money. Amongst the lot we do not see one real prime new milk-fed Sheep and Lambs. Receipts of sheep and lambs were light with prices very firm for many of good quality. Export ewes, \$5 to \$5.75; rams \$4.50 to \$5.25; good yearling lambs soil

from \$7 to \$8, and prime quality at \$50 and common lean buck lambs \$5 to \$ per cwt; spring lambs, \$3 to \$6.50 each, with some little scraggy fellows, that ought to be with their mothers, that were almost unsaleable. These small lambs reflect on the poor judgment of the farmers and drovers in not keeping them on the farm.

Over 1700 hogs were reported by the railways; as having arrived from sources, about 1200 of which came on the market. Mr. Harris reported prices ulchanged at \$6.40 for selects, fed and watered, and \$6.15 for lights.
