James Hamilton Died Saturday

Prominent Business Man and Pioneer of Lindsay-End Came Suddenly --- Mrs. Hamilton Away

Evening Post of April 20 James Hamilton, one of Lindsay's most prominent citizens, died very suddenly Saturday evening. Death was due to neuralgia of the heart. He was 65 years of age.

The late Mr. Hamilton was one of the pioneers of Lindsay, having been adentified with its development in many ways. He was for many years one of its leading business men and enjoyed to the last the respect and esteem of everyone with whom he came in contact. Mr. Hamilton was of rather a reserved disposition and never sought publicity to any extent, always keeping, however, in touch with events and well abreast of the

The deceased was for long years a member of St. Andrew's Presbyters ian, takınız an active part in all church work. Mr. Hamilton was best known

through his connection with the carriage and wood-working establishment, which he carried on here with connections all over the Dominion. He was a man of untiring enerry and in his younger days unlimited capacity for work.

His illness was of short duration. He had been up town Saturday morning feeling apparently as usual, but towards noon complained of feeling ill. Going home, he lay down and gradually became worse until death came about six o'clock.

A sad circumstance in connection with the event is that Mrs. Hamilton, wife of the deceased, was in Toronto at the time, and was unable, through unfavorable train connection, to reach home until to-day. Interment is to be made at Peterboro to-morrow, the remains being forwarded on the 10.45 morning train,

Dangerous Places on Waterway to be Made Perfectly Safe-Great Boon To Navigators Generally

Two new lighthouses are under construction for two dangerous passages and bends in the sinewous and treacherous Scugoga

Only those who are navigators of this crooked stream, as had as the ancient Meander, can appreciate the extreme unpleasantness of sailing these waters by day, let alone by night, without proper means of directing their course.

Several new lighthouses were placed last year at different bends in the river, but one of the worst, perhaps, remained unguarded, and for the purpose of safety to the public, those two new silent sentinels are being But no one in town could repair built. The sharp turn near Douglas' has been a menace to rivermen for years and the scene of more than one drowning.

It was near this, where two recent drownings occurred, and for a long period this has been considered one of the most dangerous points along the river.

Similar spots along other rivers comparatively free from stumps and other hair-raising obstacles would be considered unsafe without some means of warning. But where the mavigator has to be continually on the siert in order to keep the channel and avoid the end of a stump finding a resting place in his craft. yachting or boating of all forms becomes hazardous without a sign of what is ahead.
