His Gr. Sire, Royal Gartly, had distinguished career. As a yearling he was first at Glasgow, and first at the H. & A. S. Show at Edinburgh. In 1894 he was first at Glasgow Stallion Show, first and champion cup winner at East Kilbride, first and champion male Clydesdale exhibited Glasgow Summer show, first at Edinburgh, and second at the H. & A S. Show at Aberdeen. In 1895 he was first in the open three-year-old class at the Stallion Show, and won the Cawdor Cup, and was again first and champion male Clydesdale exhibited at the Glasgow Summer Show. That year he had the Machars of Wigtownshire premium, and at the Eastfield sale he was reserved to his owner at 900 guineas. In 1896 he was first in the aged open class at the Stallion Show, and won the Cawdor Cup second time. That year and the following one he had the Buchlyvie and Port o' Monteith premium. In 1897 and 1898 he was first at Glasgow as sire of the best group of yearling colts or fillies exhibited.
