The first paper was that of Mr. Percy Haight, whose paper, although not of his own make up, was interesting and beneficial to all. Mr. Haight stated that Sunday is the great courage strengthener. By the end of the week we have become mentally beclouded, and sometimes discouraged with the world, but before the King of Day has risen on Monday morn we have become encouraged and have taken a new life—providing we have put ourselves in—Brevities

to the Sabbath work, and taken all we can out of the day. The speaker stated that we should always be in the spirit on the Sabbath and in church if possible.

Miss J. Fee and Mr. B. Bickford then rendered a beautiful duet.

On account of Miss Seymour's absence, Mr. Nichol presented his views on the subject. Some people think that if they go to church in the morning, after that they can go and have a game of cards or baseball, or go out walking, rowing or driving, but this is one of the greatest sins that can be committed, for in 170 places in the bible we are commanded to keep sacred God's day not half of it, but all of it. We should attend church in the spirit and not disturb the meeting; Sunday is too often used for visiting day; thereby staying away from church ourselves, and keeping those whom we visit away. If a man works ten hours a day, he has then left fourteen hours for rest, two of which may be spent in rowing, driving or walking, and he should therefore observe the Sabbath. People should never neglect to give the hired servant a chance to go to church on the Sabbath, and keep it sacred as it should be.

Can a man be a Christian and not attend church service when nothing prevents? It was finally decided that he could not. One who is earnest should find no trouble in settling how many times he should attend church service.

Bobcaygeon's Fleet

Independent; The Lindsay Post gives an interesting article on the gasoline launch. The first gasoline was introduced by Mr. Grantham and it was named the Put-Put on account of the noise made by the explosive exhaust. The Julia Plante, named after Drummond's famous Julia that was wrecked on Lac St. Pierre, was the first steam launch, and since then the popularity has grown until today there are seventy-five in Lindsay. Bobcaygeon, too, is accumulating a fleet. Dr. McCamus brought the first power boat here, a coal oil engine, and we have now fifteen launches of various types, from the steam yacht Calumet down, and four more new ones to put on the waters this spring, the new ones being now under construction. SIRE—His Sire, Royal Favorite is a son of the world renowned "Royal Gartley" (9844) out of "Rose of Arnprior" (12754) by "Brooklyn" (6547) and has won several prizes locally and also at Glasgow, when young. In 1901 and 1902 he had the "Buchlyvie" premium, in 1904 the Strathmore premium, and last year he had the Scottish Central District premium. He won first prize at Glasgow in 1902 for the best group of three yearling colts or fillies exhibited. In 1903 he was first and second for yearlings and first for two-year-olds, and in 1904 he was second for two-year-olds.

His Gr. Sire, Royal Gartley, had a distinguished career. As a yearling he was first at Glasgow, and first at the H. & A. S. Show at Edinburgh. In 1894 he was first at Glasgow Stallion Show, first and champion cup winner at East Kilbride, first and champion male Clydesdale exhibited at Glasgow Summer show, first at Edinburgh, and second at the H. & A. S. Show at Aberdeen. In 1895 he was first in the open three-year-old class at the Stallion Show, and won the Cawdor Cup, and was again first and champion male Clydesdale exhibited at the Glasgow Summer Show. That year he had the Machars of Wigtownshire premium, and at the Eastfield sale he was reserved to his owner at 900 guineas. In 1896 he was first in the aged open class at the Stallion Show, and won the Cawdor Cup the following one he had the Buchlyvie and Port o' Monteith premium. In 1897 and 1898 he was first at Glasgow as sire of the best group of yearling colts or fillies exhibited. Although he died when five years old, he left a lot of first class stock, and the following are a few of the numerous prize-winners among his get: In 1897 the first and fourth yearling fillies and locality and also at Glasgow, when the second yearling filly at Ayr, and the first and fourth yearling fillies at the H. & A. S. Show at Glasgow were got by Royal Gartley. In 1898 the second two-year-old filly at Kilmarlock, the first and third two year old fillies, the second and fourth yearling fillies, the second yearling colt at Glasgow; the fourth yearling colt at Ayr; the second yearling colt at Ayr; the third two-year-old filly at Edinburgh; the second and third yearling colts, and the second yearling filly at Stirling; the fourth and fifth two-year-old and the yearling fillies at the H. & A. S. Show at Kelso; the third two-year-old colt at Wigtown; and the third two-year-old filly, and the first two-year-old colt at Newton-Stewart were all got by Royal Gartley. Royal Gartley was got by Mount Royal (8065), out of Garly Queen (10875), both of whom were distinguished prize winners.
