



April Storm and Weather Forcasts

According to Prof. Hicks Next Month Wili be Stormy

A regular storm period extends from the 2nd to the 6th. As shown by the storm diagram, this period is still under the influence of the Earth Mercury and Mars disturbances. It will come in by rising temperatures, falling barometer and growing cloudiness over the western sections by 2 and 3rd, and during the 4th and 5th these conditions, will pass eastward attended by storms of rain, hail and forceful winds. In northerly parts of the country, late snow squalls and heavy sleet will be natural and pro-

A reactionary storm period is central on the 8th, 9th and 10th. Moon passes over the celestial equator on the 8th, new moon falls on the 9th, and moon's perigee on the 10th. The indications are that very unsettled and threatening weather, will continue from the preceding period, and that renewed storms, with low barometer, high temperature thunder and wind will prevail generally the 7th and touching the 8th, 9th and 10th. Excessive warmth at this time, with much humidity and mugginess, will insure heavy hail storms in many localities, with possible torna. does. Careful observers in every locality may easily determine whether such storms are approaching them, long before they strike. Remember the dates and carefully note prevailing conditions and gathering storm clouds. Do this habitually at all storm periods. Rising barometer and change to very much cooler with frost will come from the 10th to the 13th, progressively from west to east. The 6th and 12th, central on the 9th, is a marked seismic period. We still urge all the people everywhere to watch for earthquake reports, and see how many are reported outside of the seismic periods laid down in this Almanac.

A regular storm period extends from the 14th to the 19th, central on the 16th. This period will bring low barometer and return of energetic storms on or near the 15th, 16th 17th and 18th. The Mars influence will disappear after the middle of April, and warmer, settled, springlike weather may be expected. But the first half of the month will bring much of the Mars rawness, and the boreal fluster, following the "Easter storms" will give a wintry touch to much of the storm and weather in the first half of the month. Very cool nights will be natural from the 18th to 20th, with frost to the northward.

On and touching the 22nd the temperature will rise suddenly to very warm the barometer will fall rapidly and storms of thunder, rain, hail and wind will touch many places in their quick transition from east to west. The barometer will react to higher, immediately behind these storms, bringing a sharp drop in temperature, but the change will beiof short duration. Allowing three days on either side of Sunday the 24th is another seismic period, in which current telegraph reports will probably tell of earthquake phenomena in various extremes of the earth. The earth is now practically away from the perturbing influences of both Jupiter and Saturn, hence we believe that earthquakes will subside to a minimun during the next few years.
