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ANOTHER TRAGEDY AT OAKWOOD DEATH OF WELL KNOWN RESIDENT

(Special to The Post.)

Oakwood, Thursday, March 24th—On Thursday afternoon about five o'clock our villagers received another sad shock, when it was learned that Mr. Albert E. Cameron, had committed suicide by shooting himself. Mr. Cameron had suffered from several strokes of paralysis during the past two years, and had become almost helpless, and it is supposed had become despondent. He was alone in the house at the time his wife having gone down street, and on her return she found the doors locked and called a neighbor, who was going to raise a window, when they saw the body stretched on the bed, with the revolver still in his hand which he had purchased in Lindsay this morning. Dr. Dale was hastily summoned, and neighbors hastily went to assist, but could do nothing as death had ensued. Dr. Blanchard coroner, of Lindsay, was summoned, but decided an inquest was not necessary, as everything showed it to be a case of suicide. He leaves to mourn his untimely death his widow (who is a daughter of Mrs. Prouse, of Oakwood) one daughter, Evelyn and two sons, Archie, about 13 years and Stewart about 11 years, also his father, Mr. A. Cameron, of Oakwood who are all highly esteemed residents of our village. Mrs. Woods, of Lindsay, Mrs. Griffin, of Woodstock, and Miss Margaret Cameron, of New York, are sisters. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes out to the friends so suddenly bereaved. As it was only one month ago, since Mr. Dan Grant committed suicide in our village, this has been received with great sorrow and regret, and was a great shock to all.

Repeal of the License Measure

Hon. Hanna's Bill Abolishing License Boards — New Central Authority

Telegram: A clause looked for in Hon. W. J. Hanna's act amending the Liquor License Act was not found, is the one providing for the taking of a local option vote within a year after a contest in which the majority was over fifty per cent. Temperance workers claim to have had reason to believe that the Provincial Secretary would have made this proposal law, along with other proposals closing the bar on Christmas, fixing the liquor license fee at \$500 and providing penalties for irregular practices in local option contests. The department is said to have no doubt that there is a strong public opinion supporting all these proposals which it favors and the delay in adopting this further local option suggestion is only temporary. It is understood that this and many other changes are contemplated in the act.

NEW LIQUOR LICENSE ACT.
In fact, a new Liquor License Act is said to be under consideration. When presented at the next session of the Legislature it will call for the abolition of the local boards of license commissioners and inspectors and will provide for the inauguration of a central license board for the entire province. Nothing of an official nature has been communicated, but it has been reported that a Provincial board of five commissioners has been contemplated. In some respects it would have functions similar to those of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board. As a tribunal, would deal with all license appeals and the granting of licenses.

More About the C.P.R. Grain Line

The Orillia News Letter says: The C.P.R. surveyors have been making surveys of the water front and location for their new station the past week. The News Letter has it on good authority that the Canadian Northern will build the track from Atherley to Orillia for the C.P.R. almost immediately, and will have running rights over it. They expect to be running trains into Orillia by July. The C.P.R. will not build from Orillia to Coldwater till next year, it is understood.

Work Progressing At The Locks

Work at the locks is progressing in fine shape these days. About fifty men are employed. The south wall is now practically complete, needing only a few minor touches and final layer of cement in one or two spots to finish. Men are at work digging down to the proper level so that the north wall between the upper end of the lock and Flavelles tramway can be placed. No trouble has been experienced in keeping the works clear of water although the river is about as high as is usual at this time of year during the spring freshets.

Paving Kent-st. Was Considered

Meeting of Council of Board of Health
Wednesday Afternoon

A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade was held in The Post building yesterday afternoon.

There were present Jas. Boxall, president, Allan Gillies, secretary, and Messrs. John Carew, H. B. Clemes, G. H. Wilson, Jas. Donald, F. Knowlson, R. Kylie, F. Sutcliffe.

Mr. Thos. McCrady, agent of an English paving concern, addressed the meeting, setting forth the advantages of Tarvia which can be put down for from 85 cents to \$1.25 a foot. It can be laid down over any first class maccadam road and with proper care will last indefinitely. He said that miles of this pavement is being put down in and near Boston, but there was none of it in Canada. He explained the method of putting it properly down. In the first place excavate the road bed to the depth of 12 or 14 inches. First put in a layer of coarse stone, next a grade of finer quality followed by a coating of Tarvia and finer stone, and lastly a coating of sand and Tarvia, which made a smooth, elastic pavement that was comparatively cheap and would give splendid satisfaction. Tarvia is handled in tank cars, and is heated by steam and put down hot.

WANTS ACTION DEFERRED
Mr. John Flurey addressed the meeting in reference to the paving of Kent street and asked that action be deferred until a meeting of the property holders could be called.

A general discussion of the best methods to handle the question of the paving of Kent-st., took place and the consensus of opinion was in favor of a permanent pavement, and that the street would require attention this season, and that some method should be adopted to bring those interested together and discuss the very best pavement to adopt.
