Preparations in Austria-Hungary for an Imposing Demonstration

Great preparations are being made by the Socialist parties in Austria-Hungary and Italy to ensure that their demonstration of protest against armaments on Palm Sunday shall be as imposing as possible. This demonstration promises to be on a gigantic scale. Not only will the Socialist leaders of both countries meet in Rome on April 9th to make a vigorous protest against the immense burdens laid by the military authorities upon the shoulders of the two peoples, but it is also intended to convene mass meetings and to arrange processions and other demonstrations in all the towns and industrial centres of Austria-Hungary and Italy on the same day.
