Inolculate Your Alfalia

The high feeding value of Alfalfa and its importance to the Ontario farmer as a cheap and nutritious roughage for all the classes of farm stock, is evidenced by its rapidly increasing acreage. a few hints regarding its cultivation may be season-

Sow pure seed at the rate of 20 1 per acre on clean well drained land This will give the best result but Alfalfa will grow on poor land provided it is not too weedy and is well

Undrained land, prevalence of weeds especially native grasses, close pastu ring and the lack of the proper kind of bacteria are some of the most common causes of failure in alfalfa

Bear in mind that alfalfa is a crop which men once established will last for a number of years yielding two or three cuttings each year, consef quently the cost of seeding is not so high as it would appear at first Experiments all over the Province.

have shown that the catch of alfalfa is generally benefited by innoculation or treatment of seed with a culture containing the bacteria found on the roots of Alfalfa, This culture can be obtained from the Department Bacteriology of the Ontario Agricultaral College, Greiph, or by applying to D. A. MacKenzie, the local representative, for the small sum of twenty-five cents per bottle. Each bottle contains sufficient to treat one bushel of seed. The treatment may not be necessary in every case but it insures a liberal supply of the proper bacteris when the plant is becaming estab-
