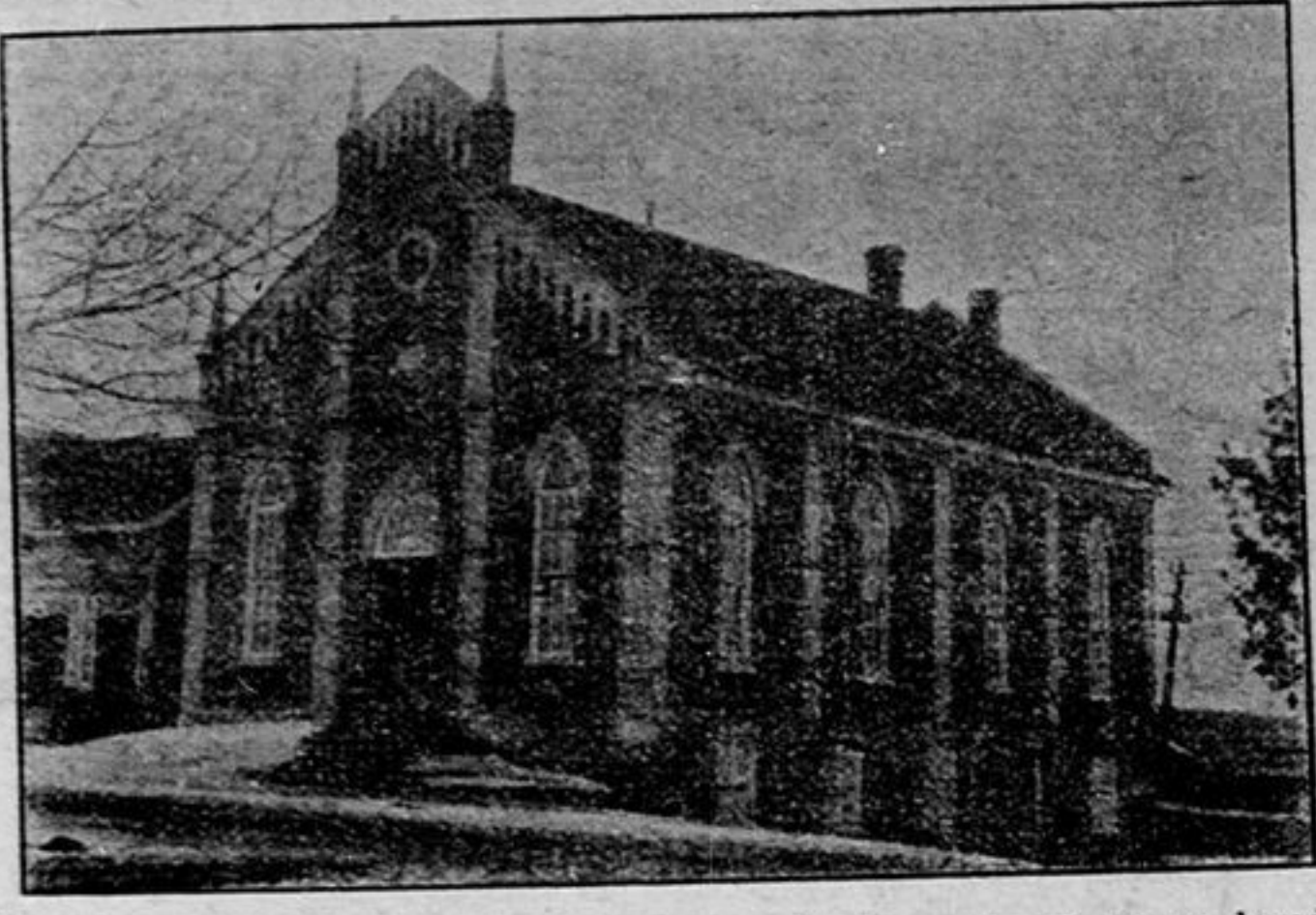

JUDGMENT DEALS A SERIOUS BLOW TO THE FOES OF LOCAL OPTION

An important judgment was given Thursday by Mr. Justice Middleton, in the case of the West Lorne local option vote in which he stated that persons who vote improperly cannot be given the protection of the statutes concerning the secrecy of the ballot, and their ballots cast improperly, are only waste paper and impede the counting of the votes.

The result of the polling in West Lorne on the local option bylaw was 141 in favor of it and 92 against. Judge Colter in scrutinizing the poll found there was an additional vote for the bylaw, but he also found that five men had voted who had no right to vote. Had Judge Colter followed the custom he would have

subtracted the five invalid votes from the poll in favor of the bylaw, and declare the bylaw defeated, but by Judge Middleton's judgment, Judge Colter cannot declare that the local option has not carried until he finds out how the five men marked their ballot papers. He must first investigate the matter to find out actual facts.

"The papers cast as ballots," said Judge Middleton, "by those not entitled to vote are not really ballots at all, and it is the duty of the Judge to eliminate from the real votes the spurious ballots mingled with the true by the inadvertent admission to the polling booth of those not entitled to exercise the franchise."

CUT OFF HER HUSBAND'S HEAD TO EVEN UP AN OLD SCORE

Sault Ste Marie, Ont., April 16.—Peter Napolitina, an Italian, living near James-st., Little Italy, known here as Peter Napiesik, was killed this evening by his wife, Margery. The woman admits having committed the murder, and is now in jail.

Napolitina was employed on the night shift at the steel plant and was asleep in bed when his wife attacked him with an axe. The first blow struck him on the forehead and nearly severed the crown of his head. Four blows followed, the last one all but severing the head from the body. The woman then proceeded out on to the street and told passers-by what she had done.

The murder is the echo of the case last Fall, when Napolitina returned home unexpectedly and stabbed her several times. She was for some months in the hospital. It seems she had awaited the opportunity to get even.

An inquest will be opened tomorrow. The dead man was 40 years of age and had four children, the eldest seven, who have been placed in charge of the Children's Aid Society.

The woman expresses no remorse and does not seem to realize her position.

TESTING THE BASCULE BRIDGE

From Monday's Post.

Today the new bascule trunion bridge over the river at Wellington-st. was tested by Mechanical Engineer Pretty of the Trent Valley Canal Department. The proceedings were watched by a large number of citizens.

The structure was raised quite satisfactorily, although a little slow. It is expected, however, that when a few minor alterations are attended to, that the bridge will be raised and lowered at will.

The test being made today is not the official one, prior to the taking over of the structure by the Government. It is expected that Mr. Alex J. Grant, Superintending Engineer, of Peterboro, will be up on Wednesday to inspect and test the new bridge.

DID NOT MURDER DEAF MUTE MATTHEWS IS ACQUITTED AT COBOURG

Cobourg, Ont., April 16.—Henry I. Matthews, of Lakeport, charged with the murder of Johanna Brimacombe, the deaf mute domestic in the hotel at Cobourg, was last night acquitted of the crime. The case was given to the jury at a quarter to seven and a few minutes after eleven o'clock they returned with a verdict of "Not Guilty." Matthews was then discharged from custody.

Ex-Reeve Henry Bicks, who on Friday night swore to having seen the deaf girl in the hotel shortly after nine o'clock, whereas Matthews, according to the evidence, left the hotel before that time, was recalled and subjected to a rigid cross-examination. He stuck to his statement. Miss Brimacombe, he said, was neatly dressed, and was wearing her glasses. When he saw her she was folding linen or washing dishes. He was not short-sighted. He had not discussed the case with anyone.

After some further questions he admitted that he had told John Reeves that he had not been subpoenaed but that he had received five dollars and was going to testify.

Mr. E. Guss Porter, counsel for defence commenced his address to the jury shortly after two o'clock and made a strong plea for acquittal, declaring that the evidence adduced by the crown was in many points contradictory, purely circumstantial, and altogether insufficient to warrant a conviction.

Mr. Peter White, Crown Prosecutor followed, and stated that if the jury were morally certain that the prisoner was not guilty of the extreme crime of murder, but guilty of a less serious crime, it was possible that the court would say that they might return a verdict of manslaughter.

SKETCH OF LIFE OF J. KEENAN

The following from the Sioux City, South Dakota, Leader, refers to the late John Keenan, whose death was recorded on Saturday:

"John H. Keenan, one of the best known residents of Sioux Falls, and one of the very oldest travelling men making this section, passed away at 4 o'clock this morning at the family residence, corner of Eleventh-st. and Prairie avenue. The above announcement will bring sorrow to the hearts of many residents of this city, but is no surprise to the relatives and immediate friends, who have known of Mr. Keenan's condition for some time past.

Up to four years ago, "Jack" Keenan, as he was known by everybody, was the perfect picture of health. He was as rugged as they made them and everyone would have predicted a long life. However, an insidious disease was at work, and about four years ago he first showed signs of a breakdown. Local physicians were consulted and he visited several sanitariums and noted physicians in search of relief. He was told by different physicians that he had different ailments, but it is the general opinion that Mr. Keenan was a victim of Bright's disease.

About the holidays Mr. Keenan, accompanied by his wife, started out on a health seeking trip. They first went to Mineral Springs, Texas. After a sojourn of some weeks there they started for California, but Mr. Keenan's condition was such that it was deemed best to return to Sioux Falls. This they did, and Mr. Keenan took to his bed, where he remained until the final summons came as stated above.

Jack Keenan was one of God's noble men. He counted his friends by his circle of acquaintances. He was a hale fellow well met and whenever he made an acquaintance he made a friend.

He was 59 years of age on April 4, thirty-two years of his life he spent as a travelling salesman and twenty-seven years of this time he travelled for one house, David Alder & Sons of Milwaukee. That is a recommendation for any man. When a person can hold down one position for twenty-seven years he is certainly doing business.

Twenty-two years ago the Keenan family moved to Sioux Falls and shortly afterwards Mr. Keenan purchased the property at the corner of Prairie avenue and Eleventh street, where he erected a fine home and there the family has resided ever since.

Deceased is survived by a wife, one daughter, Mrs. Charles McDonald, six brothers, Robert and Charles, of Sioux City, Frank, of Watertown, Alce, of South Omaha, William, of North Dakota, Edmund of California and one sister, Mrs. Cowper, of Los Angeles.

He was born in Lindsay, Canada, but moved to the United States when a boy, and has since been a true son of the United States.

Mr. Keenan was a charter member of the Sioux Falls lodge of Elks, he passed through the chairs and held the position of exalted ruler for one term, and was one of the board of trustees for several years. Besides he was on the building committee, and it was through his untiring efforts and persistent boosting, ably assisted by the other members of the building committee, that the Elks were enabled to erect their splendid home in the city. He was also a prominent member of the local branch of the Knights of Columbus.

Jack Keenan will be missed probably as much as any other resident. The funeral will take place from St. Michael's pro-cathedral Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the interment will be made in the Catholic cemetery northeast of this city."

RATES ARE FIXED FOR CENSUS TAKERS

Ottawa, April 16.—The table of rates and allowances for census commissioners and enumerators as approved by order in Council of March 23, 1911, is announced as follows:—

For correspondence with departmental and staff officers, personal studies, instructions of enumerators, examination and correction of enumerators' reports and accounts and making up returns for transmission to the Minister of Agriculture, according to instructions of the commissioner of each census district, Yukon excepted will be entitled to payment at a rate of one cent per name for each person enumerated in the population schedule.

For all other duties and to cover expenses of travel and otherwise and all other charges of office in the census districts where one commissioner is appointed, a special allowance will be given to each commissioner of a certain amount in addition to the rate of one cent per name.

The additional amounts fixed for the commissioners of Victoria and Haliburton is \$112.50 each.
