From Wednesday's Post. d this morning to hear the announce ment that Chas. Fairbairn had been ound dead in his bed in Toronto. The news spread like wildfire, and on all sides were heard expressions of refound regret at the demise of one who figured so prominently in the history of this county.

It was only last week that Mr. Fairbairn was seen on the streets of Lindsay and left for Toronto Tuesday evening last. He was in excellent health and chatted with his many rends in the same jovial and lighthearted manner that has always characterized his bearing.

Charles Fairbairn was one of Natare's noblemen. He alwyas wore his hart on his sleeve and possessed qualities which gained for him a host of friends throughout the counuy. He was a big-hearted i citizen,

> The late Mr. Fairbairn was in his seventy-fourth year and was born near Lakefield, Smith township, Peterboro county. He was a son of Andrew Fairbairn, and at an early age moved to Verulam township. He married Esther Fee in Omemee, who still survives him. As a resident of Verulam township he took an active part in municipal affairs, and served in the capacity of Councillor and Reeve for a number of years. He was also a member of the County Council and was Warden of the County Council in 1879. He was recognized as a most capable Warden, as well as an authority on municipal matters.

The late Mr. Fairbairn was attached to the Reading Room of the Provincial Legislature, and while in Toronto resided at 65 Grosvenor street, where his sad death took place.

The late Mr. Fairbairn also took an active part in Federal and Provincial politics. In 1882 the deceased ran against Mr. D. J., (now Judge McIntyre), and was defeated by 36 votes. In the fall of 1890 South Victoria was declared varant owing to the death of the sitting member, the late Adam Hudspeth.
