GRAIN HAULED FROM VICTORIA HARBOR THROUGH HERE BEFORE SNOW FLIES

Globe: Engineers have been instructed to begin at once on the location of the Canadian Pacific Railway line from Gontay, sixteen miles west of Smith's Falls, to Toronto, and it is expected that this railroad will be in operation in about two years.

Steel will be laid on the new railway from Victoria Harbor to Bethany, near Peterboro, this year, and before the snow flies it is expected that wheat will be hauled from that harbor.

In July C. P. R. upper lake steamers will be run from Victoria Harbor to the head of Lake Superior and if this route proves a success Owen Sound will be either partially or wholly abandoned as a port of the company.

The foregoing announcements were made to the Globe by Mr. D. McNicoll, Vice-President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, at the King Edward Hotel last night.

LOCATION OF NEW LINE In speaking of the new line from Gontay to Toronto, Mr. McNicoll said that the location would extend from Gontay southwest to Belleville, thence along the lake shore to a point of Leaside Jet. It would then work up to Leaside. The Company will have a grade of about four-tenths of one per cent per mile.

ENGINEERS TO START FROM TORONTO

"I shall send out some engineers on the location work from Toronto," said Mr. McNicoll, "and they will meet the parties working from the east, so before long I hope to have the line located."

A FAST PASSENGER LINE The line will be a fast passenger line. It will be on the level and as Scarborough has a high elevation it will be avoided.

The total mileage by this line to Montreal will not vary five miles from the mileage of the present main line.

It was at one time planned to start the new line from Bathurst but Gontay has been finally chosen as the junction. Double tracking from Smith's Falls to this point is now proceeding.

"Will the new road be double-tracked from the start?" Mr. McNicoll was asked.

FAVORS SINGLE TRACK "I do not know," he replied. "My idea is to have a single track at first and when the business warrants lay the double track. I would sooner have a single track through a flat country than a double track up and down dale. The bridges of this line," he added, "might be made so that it would be convenient to lay a second track at any time."

GRAND TRUNK RAILS

An Order for 40,000 Tons Placed at Sydney, N.S.

The Grand Trunk Railway has placed an order for 40,000 tons of steel rails for delivery this season in western Ontario. These will make twenty miles of 80-pound to the yard track and 240 miles of 100-pound track. The cost will amount to considerably over one million dollars. The company will ship 209 miles of its displaced track for use by the Grand Trunk Pacific in constructing yards and sidings in the west. Some of these rails have been in use since 1869 and are still good. They were imported from England at that time for the lines in Ontario. As they are only of 55 and 65-pound weight, to the yard, they are considered too light for the heavy locomotives now in use on the main lines. All the present order of rails will be filled by the Sydney, Cape Breton, mills.

DAIRYING TO TOBACCO CULTURE

Belleville, April, 24.—Because so many head of milch cows have been sold, due to a scarcity of farm help to attend to the milking, the output of cheese from this district will show a falling off this season in some sections farmers are turning their attention to the growing of tobacco. The experiment will be watched with interest, and it is claimed more money can be made growing tobacco with less work, than in the dairy business.

HOLIDAYS IN RURAL SCHOOLS

Will be the Same as in the City Schools in Future

The Legislature decided that rural school children are entitled to the same holidays as children in the towns and cities. The matter was brought up in the House by Mr. Phil Bowyer, and the expression of opinion then was so strong that the principle of the bill was adopted and incorporated in the statute law amendment act. The country children get an extra two weeks' holidays, all schools opening now on September 1.
