Summer Hotel on Sturgeon Lake Plans Are Now Under Way

THE POST HAS BEEN INFORMED BY ABSOLUTELY RELIABLE AUTHORITY THAT STEPS ARE NOW UNDER WAY FOR THE ERECTION OF A COMMODIOUS AND MODERN SUMMER HOTEL AT A POINT ON STURGEON LAKE. THE PARTIES BEHIND THE PROJECT ARE WELL KNOWN TO LINDSAY CITIZENS AND NEGOTIATIONS ARE NOW UNDER WAY REGARDING THE SITE, ETC.

IF SATISFACTORY ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE MADE, WORK ON THE HOTEL WILL START THIS SEASON AND THE STRUCTURE PUSHED TO SPEEDY COMPLETION. IF THE NEGOTIATIONS NOW PENDING ARE DELAYED, THE WORK WILL NOT BE UNDERTAKEN UNTIL NEXT YEAR.

LAST FALL THE POST ANNOUNCED THAT CERTAIN PARTIES HAD VISITED STURGEON LAKE WITH A VIEW TO CHOOSING A SITE FOR A SUMMER HOSTELRY AND THAT THEY WERE VERY FAVORABLY IMPRESSED WITH THE LOCATION AT THURSTONIA. NOTHING FURTHER WAS DONE, HOWEVER, AND IT IS BELIEVED THAT NEGOTIATIONS WERE TEMPORARILY SUSPENDED.

THE INTERESTS BEHIND THE PRESENT PROJECT HAVE NO CONNECTION WHATSOEVER WITH THE PARTIES REFERRED TO, NOR IS THE PROPOSED SITE OF THE HOTEL TO BE AT THURSTONIA. ITS LOCATION IS KEPT A SECRET AT PRESENT.

A SUMMER HOTEL ON STURGEON LAKE WOULD GIVE A GREAT IMPETUS TO THE TOURIST TRADE AND WOULD ADD GREATLY TO LINDSAY'S FUTURE AS A TOURIST CENTRE.

EMILY FARMER'S NARROW ESCAPE

Examiner: An elderly man named Bigot had a narrow escape from drowning, near Best's Station, on Good Friday. He was driving a team of horses along a road which took a circuitous course through the fields. At the spot where the mishap occurred the snow was piled up to a height of about eight feet. While passing over it one of the horses missed its footing and slipped over the edge, dragging its companion with it. Bigot jumped out of the sleigh and landed in some eight feet of snow and water.

Mr. Percy Nalsh, of this city who was visiting at the home of Mr. Latchford, which was but a short distance away from the scene of the accident, observed the struggles of the man who was gradually sinking into the water and slush. He shouted to a number of sectionmen who were working near by and together with the assistance of a number of farmers they effected a rescue. It required the united efforts of a dozen men ropes and chains to drag the horses on to terra firma. The roadway, which was but a temporary one had been undermined by the torrents of water which were pouring in from the nearby hills.

NEW SCHEDULE OF EXAMINATION FEES

Higher education and higher education fees are apparently coming together. Public School Inspectors have received a circular from the Department of Education at Toronto, announcing a new schedule of examination fees. Most striking in these changes is the innovation of \$1 fee for High School entrance. Heretofore there has been no charge for the entrance examination, but commencing this year an assessment of \$1 will be levied on each pupil trying the examination. The senior high school entrance, the higher forms of the high schools and examinations for admittance to the Collegiate Institute taken by pupils who have taken several years at a continuation school, will now be \$5.00. The fees for all other examinations, save that of entrance to normal, have also been boosted.

ROADS DEMORALIZED TRAFFIC ON THE GRAND TRUNK IN MIDLAND DISTRICT

The heavy rains of Sunday morning and the accompanying deluge caused a deal of inconveniences in the local system of the Grand Trunk last night and this morning. In the city the bulk of the water disappeared, there still remained in more exposed parts a considerable amount of that element which hindered the flow of rain water. In many parts of the country the flow, coming from the surrounding hills and the swamp flooded the track at Lily Lake to the extent of twelve to fourteen inches and in some places a distance of half a mile. The road was therefore inaccessible. This morning's train from Port Hope to Toronto, due at 8.20, was delayed by the 8.20 Lakeland train, after having an extra coach attached, proceeded on its regular journey to Millbrook, and the passengers for Toronto were able to continue their journey via the old road. The Belleville train journeyed to Millbrook and returned with passengers for Peterboro from Toronto and other points west. Several years ago similar difficulty was experienced, but for a year or two the thaw has been more gradual.

The track was also flooded at the gravel pit, a short distance east of Blizzards, yesterday, and a train had to be sent to take the passengers of the Belleville local. A work train was then assigned the duty of clearing the Belleville track, which was soon accomplished.

At the Tile factory near Port Hope too, there was much water on the track, but the difficulty must have been quickly righted, for the trains are running on schedule. Two washouts were also reported.

CALL TO REV. DR. JOHNSTON

The following from the Montreal Witness refers to a former highly esteemed pastor of St. Andrew's church, Lindsay, some fifteen years ago:

The Rev. Dr. Johnston, minister of the American Presbyterian church has received a call from Emmanuel Presbyterian church, Los Angeles, California.

Dr. Johnston's first intimation of this was in a night letter. When interviewed by a 'Witness' reporter this morning he said that he could give no information yet. He had never been in Los Angeles.

The Emmanuel Church in Los Angeles is the largest Presbyterian congregation, as well as the most influential in California. Dr. Hugh Walker, the former pastor, has recently accepted a call to Atlanta.

The Rev. Dr. Johnston has held the pastorate of the American Presbyterian Church in this city for nine years, coming as successor to the Rev. T. S. McWilliams, D. D., then called to Cleveland to an influential pulpit. Dr. Johnston during his stay in Montreal, has received many invitations, both from across the water and from the other side of the border, to assume pastorates, but so far none of these attractions have tempted him to leave Montreal.

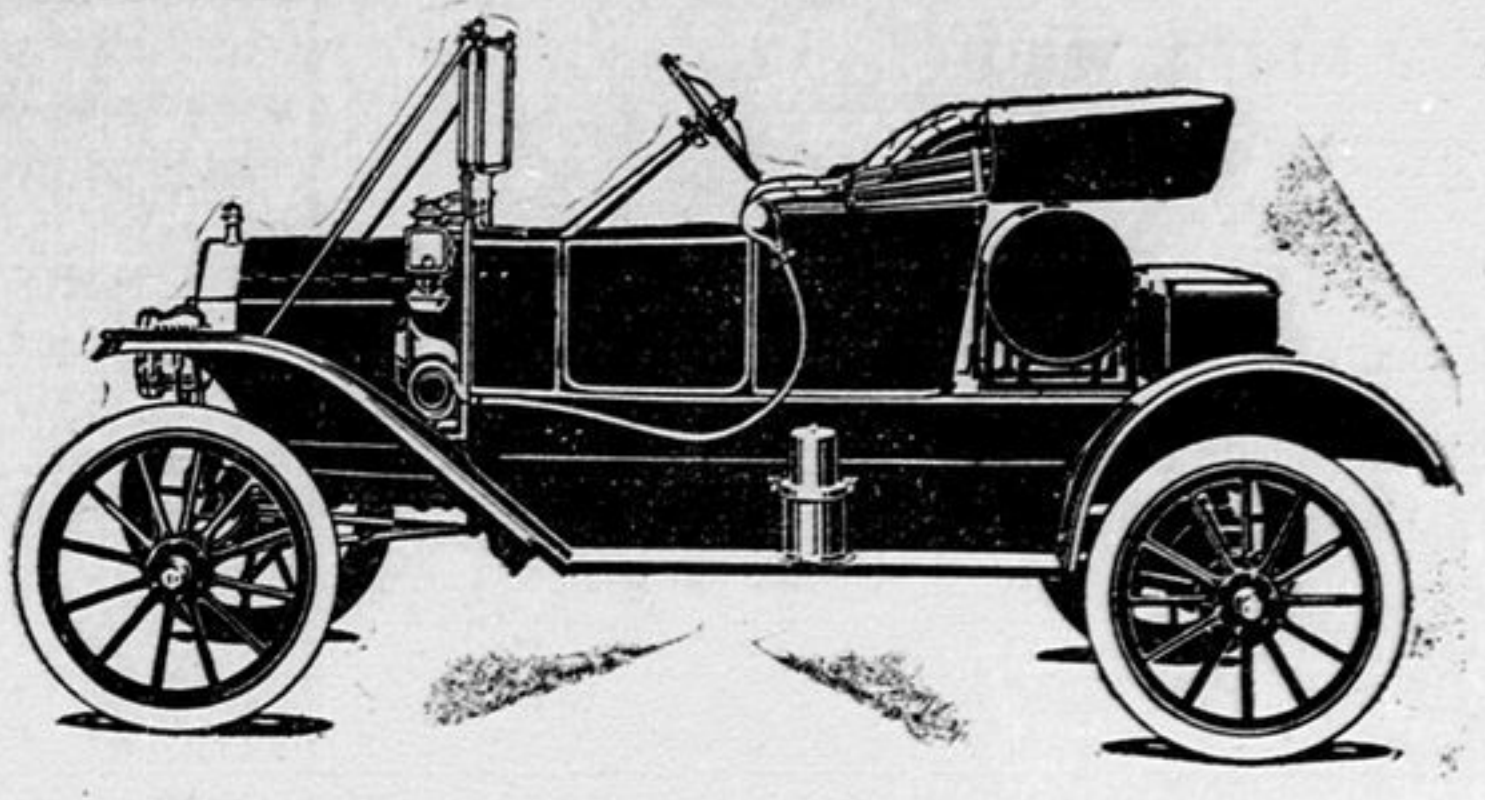
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MADISON WILLIAMS LINDSAY
