MUST NOT KILL **MORE THAN 100 DUCKS**

The following amendment to the Ontario Fisheries Act will interest local sportsmen:

1. Section 14 of the Ontario Game and Fisheries Act is amended by adding thereto the following subsection: (4) No person shall take or kill more than one hundred wild ducks in

2. The Ontario Game and Fisheries Act is amended by adding thereto the following section: 1

40a. No person shall sell or offer for sale, or purchase, or enter into any agreement to sell or purchase any wild duck at any time, and no person shall ship or cause to be shipped by any means of transportation any wild duck to be wold either within or without this privilege.
