WILL SPECIFY ON

The Ontario Voters' Lists Act is imended by adding the following subsections, which were given their first reading March 17th:-

"The Clerk in making out the voters' list shall in a separate column. provided for that purpose, write the letter "P" opposite the name of each person who is a public school supporter and the letter "S" opposite the name of each person who is a separate school supporter.

The Voters' Liet Act is also amended by adding the following as section 16a:-


