THE NEW GAME

There is a new game of baseball called playground ball. It is to give encouragement to a prolonged period of playing the game among men who have passed the age of physical condition when they may comfortably handle a hard ball or run thirty yards between bases. There is no reason for the use of mask, protector and gloves. Ten players constitute a side. The diamond may be laid out in a school yard, playground, vacant lot, golf club grounds, tennis court, or on a lawn. The first batter at bat, at his own discretion, may run to either third or first base. Scoring by points gives every successful and team credit for every successful play that places a man on a base. This method of scoring (five innings constitute a full game) enables school and playground leagues to conduct tournaments. Each side of the diamond is 35 feet long. The pitcher's plate is 30 feet from the home plate. The ball is not less than 12 nor more than 14 inches in circumference. The bat is 2 1/4 feet long and not larger than two inches in diameter and made entirely of wood.

REV. G. W. HENDERSON

Formerly of Lindsay, Preached Sunday at Queen-st. Church—Large Congregation Hear Two Excellent Sermons.

"Christ as an example, to all men for all things," was dwelt upon on Sunday morning at Queen-st. Methodist church, by Rev. G. W. Henderson, of Port Hope, who throughout the day, occupied that pulpit.

Rev. Mr. Henderson is always a interesting speaker. That fact forces itself upon one at the outset. His addresses while preceptive and didactic are also practical.

The great, the astounding thing about the incarnation of the Saviour is, said Mr. Henderson, in opening the fact that the Almighty should be born to earth in such a lowly state. The fact that He was born similar to every human being, or the circumstances surrounding this birth are not so remarkable except that He was born so lowly. (One that He was born so lowly.)

But more than all this was the sacrifice of the Saviour on the Cross, the most ignominious death it was possible in those days to give a man.

AN EXAMPLE.
 This great sacrifice, continued the speaker, was an example which all men should emulate, not literally, but in the sense that everyone should endeavor to help their fellow-men—not hesitating to deny themselves some much prized or greatly desired thing. In passing the speaker

er instanced different people who have shown this Christ spirit, more than one not stopping at death in the cause of a friend, of their religion or their country.

THE DRINK EVIL.
 Incidentally, Mr. Henderson had a few words to say about the evil of intemperance, having regard to over indulgence in strong liquors. He had nothing to say about the man who said he could drink or leave it alone. For the time being he would grant that such a thing possible as a moderate drinker. But he was tired, said Mr. Henderson, of the man who could be so inconsiderate of other men, who not so greatly blessed with a strong will, could not stop at the "moderate" stage. He was out of patience with the man who thus acted as a "stumbling block" to his weaker kindred neighbor.

Rev. Mr. Henderson is by no means a stranger to Lindsay. For three years he has been at Port Hope, but prior to that he was pastor of Cambridge-st. Methodist church in this town. He was given many hearty greetings yesterday.

The church was crowded at both services. The choir rendered special music both morning and evening.

Will Safeguard Town's Interests and ask that Plant be Installed Before Money is Paid.

The Water Commissioners held a special meeting on Monday to discuss the contents of a letter from J. Howard Bridge, Esq., of Philadelphia, in regard to his proposition to the board and which was, in effect, to install his plant here, the city to give him \$1,500 down, and \$2000 when all was running properly, as he promised it would.

But the board did not see it that way and in consequence asked Mr. Bridge to put in his plan if he wanted to, but to do it at his own expense and then, if all was running satisfactorily, the city would be willing to take over his plant and pay him a good price for it. The board was firm in its stand not to try out any experiments here, and told Mr. Bridge so politely. Mr. Douglas Sinclair wanted a clause inserted in the

agreement that Mr. Bridge must leave the present plant in as good condition as when he got it, but the rest of the board told Mr. Sinclair that he need have no fears about Mr. Bridge and the damage he might do as they did not expect to hear from him again.

The Secretary has written the engineer to the effect that Lindsay would not pay him a cent until his plant for the purification of city water supply is in perfect running order.
