# THE C.P.R. TROUBLES SERIOUS FIRE AT SOO

Employes Want the Entire System Dealt With.

CONCILIATION BOARD

It Meets at Winnipeg - Mr. Hardy Makes Statement - Company Says Only Western Lines Concerned-Men Say Agreement Should Be Come to For Both East and

West-Meets Again To-day. Winnipeg. May 19.-The C.P.R. conciliation board met yesterday. G. Hall, superintendent of the locomotive department, submitted that the board should not go beyond questions affecting the western lines. Bell Hardy chairman of the C. P. R. mechanisal unions, claimed that they should leal with similar questions throughcut the whole system as the only means of securing peace.

At the request of the chairman Mr. Hardy made a statement reviewing the whole situation. The question whether the whole system or the western lines only shall be dealt with will have to be settled before any progress can be made by the board, which meets again to-day.

### Pork Was Diseased.

Port Arthur, May 19 .- A joint meeting of the City Council and Board of Health was held yesterday to meet representatives of the Winnipeg meat packers to discuss allegations made by City Meat Inspector Trenks that pork received from the west was found infected with trichina. J. T. Gordon, Gallagher and Dr. Torrance, maintained that this was the only place in all Canada where such infection had been alleged. When Inspector Trenks showed his samples Dr. Torrance admitted that he was right in confiscating the meat. It was finally decided to leave the matter with the Provincial Board of Health.

Street Car Strikers Are Lawless. Cleveland, O., May 19 .- A Broadway street car was partially destroyed by

a dynamite torpedo last night. Twenty-five passengers were in the car, no one was seriously hurt. panie followed and a mad rush for the exits was made. A West Madison street car also was

damaged by an explosion of powder upon the track. The floor of the car was broken through, and one woman was severely injured.

Sandflies Cause Accident.

Hamilton, May 19 .- Sandflies are so numerous around the bay shore and west end that the yard superintendent had to issue an order for engineers to slow down coming into the Grand Trunk yards at the western city limits. The rails were so slippery from the flies on Sunday that a light engine got beyond control, and crashed into another locomotive, damaging both.

Stratford, May 19 .- Michael Goett-Jer had his nose broken, several teeth knocked out, and his left leg broken while attending horses in a stall on Sunday. He was unconscious for upwards of an hour.

Captain of Montcalm Suspended. Montreal, May 19.-Capt. Belanger of the Government steamer Montcalm loses his certificate for a year as the result of the collision of that vessel with the C.P.R. liner Milwankee at Quebec some two weeks ago. solidated Company's Plant

TWO MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES

Pulp Mill Dynamo Room Destroyed-Power Plant Damaged-Power of Street Car Lines and Light and Water Systems Cut Off - Loss \$300,000, Covered by Insurance -Will Rebuild at Once.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 19.-Fire which is supposed to have started from a spark from the dynamo in the power house of the Lake Superior power house early yesterday morndestroyed the Tagona Water and Light power house, the Lake Superior Co.'s power plant, and the Seo Pulp and Paper Mill storeroom. The estimated loss is about \$300,000, fully covered by insurance.

Two men, A. R. Walsh, dynamo tender, and E. Gray, his assistant, lost their lives in the fire. The water, lighting and street car system are affected, but it is expected power will be furnished from the

Steel Plant auxiliary to operate the

street railway. Water is now being supplied by the Pulp Mill auxiliary steam pumps. It is believed the direct cause of the fire will never be known, as the only men who were in the room at time are dead. According to statements made by those who knew the workings of the dynamo room the fire might have started from a short circuit on a dynamo. The men in charge made every attempt to check the fire and Walsh climbed upon the machinery and came in contact with a

live wire, ending his life. Gray, it is supposed, attempted to rescue his comrade, and his clothes caught fire. He rushed from the building and passed through the pulp mill followed by a number of employes who made every effort to overtake him and remove the burning clothes. Ascending the stairs at the head of the northern tail race, he plunged into the

It is given out that all departments will be rebuilt at once.

Insane Clergyman.

Fairmont, W. Va., May 19.-Temporarily insane, according to his own statement, Rev. S. A. Coffman, aged 50 years, a prominent Methodist Episcopalian clergyman, killed his wife yesterday by cutting her throat. A moment after the crime, he says, he regained his senses and realized what he had done. He surrendered himself and was locked up.

Rev. Mr. Coffman says it had been his intention to kill not only his wife, but also his family and himself.

The C. P. R. Censured. Ottawa, May 19 .- The jury in the investigation into the wreck of the C. P. R. last September when Fireman J. K. Blackburn was killed, yesterday handed in their verdict. Reynolds, the engineer, was able to leave the hospital and complete the evidence. They blame the railway company for negligence in not placing a night operator at the station and in having the ballast train which was run into, on the main line when there was room for it on a siding.

Cotton Mills Close Down.

Montreal, May 19.-Owing to the strike of mule-spinners at the Valleyfield mills of the Montreal Cotton Co. about three weeks ago, the company has closed the mills, throwing three mule-spinners were called out by Federation of Textile Workers of Canada as a protest against the 10 per cent. decrease in wages. Without the mule-spinners, it was known the mills could only be kept in operation for a limited length of time.

Australia's Loyalty.

Moir Committed For Trial. London, Ont., May 19.—Pte. W. A. Moir was committed for trial for the murder of Col.-Sergt. Lloyd on April 18. Edmund Meredith, K.C., who is defending Moir, said he had no statement to make. Moir appears to be greatly troubled, and it is feared that he may attempt suicide.


