An Emily resident stated to The Post this afternoon that the fire occurred about two o'clock Saturday morning. Mrs. Fitzpatrick was roused from her slumbers by one of the children, who was somewhat restless, and was startled to find the house in flames.

Mr. Fitzpatrick was severely burned about the head and face, and was almost suffocated by the dense smoke. Dr. Blamhard was summoned to attend him, and his condition was rather serious until Sunday evening, when he showed signs of improvement.
