To prevent the tranble and expense caused by freight being lost or damaged in transit, the Canadian Freight Association is directating amongst the freight agents of the different railways an illustrated booklet, which shows how freight is lost or damaged and how this source out loss can be avoided. In the brothure a strong point is made of the absolute necessity for having all freight shipped in propershape and plainty addressed.

Among other things; that freight men and shippers should remember the booklet makes the following points:-"Shippers and consignes blame the

corriers when a shipment of freight fails to reach its destination or is delisered to consignee in as damaged condition. But a smaller number stop to think it is more their fault than the carriers. In the beginning the fundamental rule of cartiers in accepting merchandise was the requiring of each package to be plainly marked, showing full mame of con signes and destination. From a wi linguess to oblige patrons this vital requirement has been so far "side tracked," so to speak, that it is no unusual for boxes, bales, bundles and pieces to be accepted without any marks. Coupled to the disappearance of full marks came the gradual de cline in the strength of packages in which goods are shipped.
