SPLENDID ADDRESS.

In opening Mr. Stevens said that the writing of our schools is not nearly up to the mark. It was so far from the mark that in many cases it was a disgrace to our schools. All the teachers who were present knew what was to be done education. He asked for the hearty to get a good writing class, but the co-operation of all the teachers trouble was they fail to carry out the rural schools. what they know. To be a good writer one should study and practice at it until they are perfect. Nobody accomplish anything without practice. There are, said the speaker, a number of faults which writers which keep them from writing good. The most important of these faults is the bad position. To write well a person has first all to sit right and hold his pen or pencil in the right manner. No percan write and at the same be swinging their feet under They must be placed flat on the floor. The most essential thing in good writing is to sit up straight get a good free hand movement. The child should lean forward from the hips, not from the shoulders. Each class in school should have daily exercise at the blackboard. It is good to cultivate a free hand movement, and is an exercise which the children like. Practice is neces sary to be a good writer, and an exercise should be practiced until accomplished. Form and movement have got to go together to make good writing. One can't go without the other. Inspector Stevens offered a good deal of encouragement to the poor writer, and explained that if one only tried they could all make good writers.
