After that he became domestic prelate to the Pope and then Vicar General of the diocese. During the year 1894-5 he was administrator the diocess and in August, 1899 he was consecrated Bishop of London, succeeding Bishop O'Connor and he remained there until his elevation to the Archbishopric of Toronto into which office he was publicly inducted July 17, 1908.
