COMMITTEE DEALING WITH POWER BYLAW

Archbishop McEvay Called By Death Deceased a Former Resident of Lindsay

Citizens of all denominations in Lindsay and district heard with regret this morning that Archbishop Fergus P. McEvay died at 12.15 this morning at his official residence, Toronto.

The deceased prelate was born in Emily township and received his early education there, and also at the Lindsay Separate School.

In the death of Archbishop McEvay an outstanding figure in the Catholic

Church in Ontario and particularly in the diocese of Toronto, has been removed. Despite the physical disability under which he labored, his Grace brought to bear upon the diocese that fine tact and excellent executive ability coupled with diplomacy, that will forever make his name revered.

The late Archbishop McEvay was a man of wide outlook, and possessed a loveable personality, ill-health precluded him from moving among his people as much as he would have desired, but in the instructions that he delivered to his subordinates he demonstrated that his one wish was for the spiritual promotion of his flock. The late archbishop was in no sense militant, and while endeavoring to promote the welfare of the Catholic church, he ever evinced a desire to live in peace and amity with the various other religious bodies.

Deceased had been ailing for some time with a form of disease that sapped his strength and while on the advice of his physicians he visited various health resorts, his ailments proved of such an insidious character as to leave recovery out of the question. He was a young man as life goes, and filled with the "Joy of Living" for the good that he felt he could have done, but when the "dark horseman" came he was quite prepared to receive him.

Right Rev. Fergus Patrick McEvay was born in Downeyville, December 8, 1852 and there he received his primary education. Afterwards he attended St. Michael's College and Toronto University, where he completed his classical studies. His course in theology was made at the Grand Seminary, Montreal, and in 1882 he was ordained to the priesthood by the late Archbishop Cleary at Trenton. For his great sacerdotal work he chose the Kingston diocese. Later he was transferred to the diocese of Peterboro, and was, on account of the activity he displayed in parochial work, given charge of the missions of Bobcaygeon, Galway and Fenelon Falls.

When Bishop Dowling succeeded Bishop Jamot of Peterboro in 1887, Father McEvay was appointed Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral, Peterboro. The zeal of the newly appointed rec-

tor found outlet here for it was to him that His Lordship Bishop Dowling, entrusted the remodeling of the cathedral, the purchasing of property for the future hospital and the acquiring of houses for parochial and episcopal uses.

Soon after completing these duties Father McEvay was moved to Hamilton, where he filled the office of secretary to the Bishop and rector of the cathedral. There, too, honors from Rome were accorded him, when he was appointed private chamberlain to His Holiness, the late Pope Leo XIII. After that he became domestic prelate to the Pope and then Vicar-General of the diocese. During the year 1894-5 he was administrator to the diocese and in August, 1899 he was consecrated Bishop of London, succeeding Bishop O'Connor and he remained there until his elevation to the Archbishopric of Toronto into which office he was publicly inducted July 17, 1908.

He was the third Archbishop of Toronto to come from London during the past fifteen years, the others being Archbishop Walsh and Archbishop O'Connor, the latter of whom is still living in retirement at St. Clair Novitiate. All three found the duties of the office extremely heavy. Archbishop O'Connor was forced two years ago on this account to relinquish the honor, and upon Archbishop McEvay many evidences of the great strain have been apparent.

During his short tenure of office as Archbishop of Toronto, he undertook many diocesan changes, one of the first of these being to redistribute the parishes in the more populous centres and to establish new churches.

The late Archbishop's mother, lives in Toronto together with a brother and sister. He was a nephew, of Mrs. Corkery, of Lindsay.

TRESPASSERS ON PROPERTY OF C. P. R. WILL BE PROSECUTED IN FUTURE

Mr. J. W. Anderson, C.P.R. station agent, has received a copy of the following circular, issued to all station agents on the line: Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Office of the Superintendent, Refer to file 131.1 Toronto, May 1, 1911. Subject: Personal accidents to trespassers—All Agents.

The number of personal accidents to trespassers on our property is assuming such proportions that we will have to adopt stricter measures to stop it, and the only effective way of doing this is to prosecute before a Magistrate each and every case of trespass. If the parties are known, and are habitual offenders they should be

served with summonses. If tramps they should be arrested.

Last year on Eastern Lines, out of a total of 123 casualties, 93 or over 75 per cent, were trespassers.

Representatives of the local newspapers should be informed as to the course the Company proposes to pursue in this matter, so that same will be given publicity.

All persons concerned in this matter are requested to read the above notice. Mr. Anderson's instructions are explicit and in case the company's premises are trespassed upon he has no alternative to doing his duty by procuring prosecution of the offenders against the company's orders.

WORK OF TAKING OF THE CENSUS WAS EXPLAINED TO THE COMMISSIONERS

Messrs John O'Reilly, census commissioner Victoria County, and E. Noice of Haliburton County, were in Toronto Monday receiving instructions on the art of taking a census by Mr. J. C. MacPherson special census officer for Ontario. The Post was informed by one of these gentlemen that the census would be taken on June 1. The decisive hour of reckoning is twelve o'clock midnight May 31, 1911, so that anyone born before that hour or anyone dying after that hour should be taken.

No advance information is to be given out by any person but the Minister of Agriculture or someone acting under his authority. The census is expected to be taken in the shortest time possible consistent with efficiency and accuracy. The enumerators are not confined to any special hours per day during the work. They are paid by a schedule of rates that with diligence should provide a fair day's wage for the work done. No enumerator can farm or sublet his work to any other person. The work must be completed by himself, and all returns made to the Commissioner for this district to be forwarded to the census officer at Ottawa by the end of next month.

Provision has been made for enumerating up to 8,000,000 persons.

ALL INFORMATION SECRET

All information is collected under an oath of secrecy, and no person need have any doubt in answering all questions on the various schedules that such answers will be used for tax or on any other purpose than compilation into tables for the office staff at Ottawa. Each clerk has to take and subscribe to an oath of secrecy.

Manufacturers are requested to be explicit in answering questions relating to the kind or class of products, and their respective values.
